Tesch figured in a double right off the reel. The crowd in the stand gave him a hearty welcome back. Spillane actually got a hit. When he came to bat in the latter part of the game a boy in the stand yelled "Here comes the home run hitter." He made a single and the audience roared. Slemin dropped a fly and Ivers let a throw get away from him. Spillane made a great stop of a ground ball hit by Ort and then threw it many feet over Ivers head.

Riley pitched for the Saints and certainly got off lucky. He got away with the game due much to lame fortune. The Saints' fielders had a busy time gathering in flies.

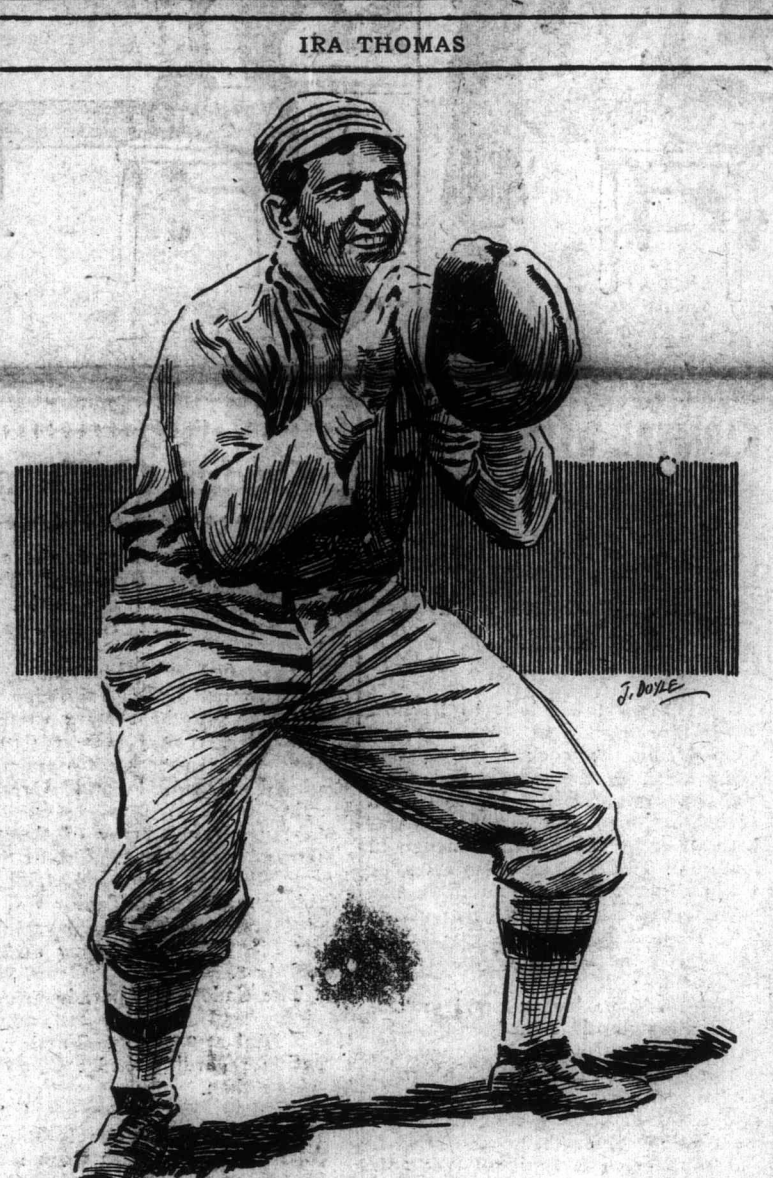
