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

try New Course Provided for Disabled Soldiers Dental mechanics is one of the little known trades in which returned men are manifesting an interest

tary Hospitals Commission have been called upon to make provision for 't in their re-education courses. The work requires mechanical skill and a fine eye for detail and holds, through its demands for fine work and ingenuity, an unusual interest for the able man who has been incapacitated for heavier work.

In France a school of dental mechanics has been established for disabled soldiers by Dr. Quintero of Lyons, and a large class of veterans is under instruction, but the Military Hospitals Commissions has made arrangements for Canadian men to take the work in established schools here. The work pays well and a skilful man can become an efficient workman in eight months.

The course has been granted to several soldiers one a Montreal man who before he enlisted was a very successful salesman, drawing a good salary. He suffers now from an injured hip and cannot walk without pain. He must have work at which he can ait.


