Capt. Fred W. Wickwire Seriously Ill But Improving

The relatives of Capt. Fred W. Wickwire have lately received word from General Foster that Capt. F. W. Wickwire from this town of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, had been admitted to hospital in France seriously ill with pneumonia.

Captain Wickwire, who before going overseas was engaged in newspaper work and afterwards farming in Kentville, has been in France for almost two years. More than two years ago he sailed from St. John as second in command of No. 6 Company, Canadian Army Service Corps. A year ago he was given command of No. 5 Company Canadian Army Service Corps which company he has ably commanded in France ever since. His many letters home told of much hard work but a very interesting life, and when he wrote he seemed to be in very good health. His many friends here and in Kings County, hope that further news will tell of his recovery.

A subsequent cable announced that he was improving. Captain Wickwire has done noble service and spoken of in glowing terms by the wounded soldiers who have returned.

Have Hun Submarines Been Trapped or Sunk in the North Sea?

London, March 5—Have the German submarines given up their campaign, or have they been trapped in a British net?

That is the subject of an interesting discussion in naval circles here today. To understand the situation that has given rise to such speculation, it is necessary to consider the following figures relative to the submarine campaign, which has dwindled down to almost nothing since the close of February: In the first five days of March the aggregate of shipping destroyed has been three ships, of 6,376 tons, or a daily average of only 1,275 tons. During the twenty-eight days of February there were sunk 208 ships, an average of 17,252 tons. In other words, by the terms of this comparison the daily toll of destruction has fallen off eighty-seven per cent.

The abrupt decrease in the submarine operations is shown even more strikingly in comparisons of the results of the first and last five days of February. In the first five days of February there were sunk 31 ships, of 41,887 tons, in the last five days 33 ships, of 109,165 tons; and in the first five days of March three ships, of 6,376 tons.

These figures cannot be taken as exactly accurate, for the reports have not always been definite, and undoubtedly news will be received at a latter date of additional sinkings during the last five days. However, they afford a sufficiently accurate basis for the conclusion that beginning with the first day of March there was an abrupt decrease in the number of vessels that fell victims to the enemy's undersea craft.

Naval men explain this fact in two ways. Some argue that the German authorities have decided the submarine campaign is not worth the candle, and consequently have recalled all or most of the raiders. The majority of experts consider it in the following light, however. They contend that the submarines sent out from their bases early in February had exhausted their supplies of food, fuel and torpedoes, by the end of the month, and started back to replenish them while other submarines came out to take their places. The explanation of the sudden falling off in sinkings is that most of these returning submarines were caught in a British trap laid along the shallow waters bordering the German coast.

A week back, when Britain declared the extension of her blockade in the North Sea to cover virtually the entire coast of Germany, it was rumored persistently that an almost impenetrable network of mines had been laid by British boats across the entrances to the chief German ports. Nets similar to those protecting the Straits of Dover were also reported to have been stretched for miles and miles across the lanes of travel for enemy commerce.
