meetings. The High School By-Law was the chief item of the bill-of-fare. At the township meeting in the afternoon members of the council, led by Reeve Ferguson, vigorously assailed the proposal, claiming that at present the township was bearing an unfair proportion of the cost of maintaining the school and promising that, if the By-Law were defeated, they would se-cure such an adjustment of rates and such changes in present conditions as would not impair the efficiency of the school but would greatly lessen the taxes to be contributed by the town-

ship.
At the village meeting in the even ing the other side of the case was ably presented by Reeve Holmes, Messrs Parish and Arnold, and the Rev. W

G. Swayne. The Reeve discussed the question in a general way, pointing out the stlen-did record of the school, its importance to the people of the district, and the small amount (less than 6c per hundred dollars of assessment) now asked to add to its efficiency and to make it satisfy the requirements of the Educa

tion Department.

Mr Arnold read a number of official reports showing that these require ments were imperative and that failure to make the improvements would re sult in the withdrawal of the govern ment grant.

Mr Parish briefly reviewed the his ory of the school since its inception and showed beyond peradventure that the county was dealing liberally with the school and under the present ad-
