# Tom and the Clairvoyant.

AN OLD TIME CORRESPONDENCE RECALLED BY THE PALMIST D SPUTE.

Although our good friend, P. C. Groves has no use for palmists he seems to have a weakness for clairvoyants. He doesn't believe any palmist can look in his hand and foretell the future. But when it comes to a clairvoyant looking into a piece of glass and "seein' things," Thomas appears to think it is all right. The following correspondence which appeared in the Planet in 1894, after the drowning of the late John Young and the recovery of his body will, in view of Mr. Groves' statements that he prosecuted Mile. Matilla as a fakir, will prove of some interest:

THE YOUNG CLAIRVOYANT. Sir,-1 have been requested by large number of persons to state to the public what I know in regard to the finding of the body on Saturday. In the first place when I heard of the young clairvoyant's coming I did not believe it could be done, but it does seem strange to me that the body was found in a direct line across the river from where we were searching. If it had not been for Miss Quellette we should not have been searching within 50 yards of the place. The Chief of Police gave me instructions to take the two boats on Saturday and go towards the hospital and search the bend thoroughly, but having heard that the young addy would be down Saturday morning I sent the two boats to the bend in the river to search, and procured another boat for Capit. A. Barr, myself, the girl and her friends. We gut in and I told her where the man was last seen. When we came along-s.de of the steam barge "Owen," she looked through the giass, and when opposite the 'City of Chatham," she instructed Mr. Barr to row over to Dr. Holmes' stable. From Dr. Holmes' stable From Dr. Holmes' stable she pointed a direct line amidships of the "City of Chatham," and told us to drag the river across the stream. We endeavored to drag straight across but could not drag straight across, but could do so on account of the current. When we were not in line, however, she would tell us so, and, finally, I secured the scow and floated it across the river, asking her to row in the boat and point out the exact spot. She did so, but the body was found fifty feet further across the river from the point she said. Before we commenced to search, Miss Quellette stated we would find a large tree top and lots of brush, which we did, and and she also said the body was fast under a log. I tried to alter her opinion by asking her if she thought we were in

Archie Skirving, who was also en-gaged in the search, naturally per-ceived the humbug of the whole thing, and undertook to expose the clairvoy ant's claims in the following letter Sir,-For the past week or so, I have been wondering whether we are liv-ing in 1894 or the year 1. Our boasted free education and civilization eems to have done very little for the masses, when so much superstition revails as has been manifested in hatham during the last few days. Such arrant humbug is worthy only f the Aborigines from whom it has

been handed down. There is a legal aspect to the sitnation, which probably has not occurred to "Fair Flora," for, if I understand Canadian law correctly, it pecially deals with clairvoyants and fortune tellers.

I will, however, touch no further on

the moral aspect of the case, but sim-ply tell your readers some facts rela-

on Saturday afternoon last I was watching the parties of searchers, and came to the conclusion that they were widely astray. Any sensible person would readily infer that had the body fallen in the river at the north end of the bridge, it could not by any means get over to near Dr. Hoimes' stable, but rather that it would follow the current, which would taken it down near the Owen or the City of Chatham. I think it is hardly necessary to add that the body was not found there, or anywhere near there, nor even in the so-called "line"—whatever that may be—but it was found by practical men near the City of Chatham, 100 feet from Flora's location and in the only amon sense place that anything but gross ignorance would suggest. If this clairvoyant was so positive

of the exact location of the body, why did she not ask for one of the many poles and other appliances, which were so convenient to her at the time and reaching down secure it? Groves, although not mentioned in Mr. Skirving's letter, seems to have taken the latter's denunciation of the clairvoyancy fake as a person-al matter, and he replied in a column communication to The Planet. The first part dealt with plans of the river showing the location of buildings, boats, body, etc., and then the com-munication went on as follows: To hear Mr. Skirving talk, he wants

to make out we are all a lot of ignor-ant men, just because we don't thirk as he does. It's a good thing there's difference of opinion. I was honestly trying to give to the public wlat Miss. Ouellette said and did and to give her credit for no more than she deserves. Mr. Skirving boasts about free education and how little it has done for the masses. It seems so in this case. Why did Mr. Skirving commit himself and acknowledge her power just as soon as he commenced to drag in the place where she said the body was? He says in his letter he was watching us before he came over to drag, and at the same time knew we were all estray. That's learning for you. Now, sir, I will tell you how a man could have been smart who don't believe in Clairvoyants and fortune tellers. He should have kept away and not gone near the place where the girl

was, but denounce her at once and go some other place and find the body. Then he would make for himself a name that could be handed down without any puff or blow from any particles. per.
