Public School Leaving Exams. to be Continued In Kent-Decision of Board.

The county board of examiners met in Harrison Hall at 10 a, m. on Sat-urday, Present W. H. G. Colles, I. P. I., Robert Park, I. P. S., and Geo.

Under the provisions of 87(a), the certificates of Ira E. Shepley, Carrie Burns, Minnie McCreary and Fred

Tobey were renewed.

Moved by Mr. Colles, seconded by
Mr. Miller, that a public school leaving examination for the fifth classes in the public schools of this county be held by the county board of examiners, at the same time and at the same centres as the high school entrance examinations, year by year, until such examinations be resumed by the Education Department. That candidates passing this examination be given certificates of having completed the course for part I, junior leaving, as re-quired by the department, and that each candidate shall pay a fee of one dollar towards defraying the cost of the examination, instead of two dollars as heretofore.-Carried unani-

The subjects of examination will be the same as before-Arithmetic, grammar, geography, history and composition, with one additional subject to be chosen from among the other obligatory supjects upon the curriculum for Fifth Form, as found upon the outside cover of the school registers. There has been no changes in the

regulations governing continuation lasses in the public schools.

The action of the county board of xaminers with a view to saving the continuation classes appears to nost opportune and will give confidence and aim to teachers and pupils n advanced work in public schools,
