On Friday morning I went on an excursion to Sandy Hook to follow the Lucitania into the New York harbor. She is the largest trans-Atlantic steamer in the world, and is equipped with turbines and every modern convenience. Her speed is twenty-six to twenty-eight knots an hour-nearly thirty miles an hour. She draws forty feet of water, is 862 feet long, and 60 feet from keel to main deck. She is equipped with Marconi system long distance telegraph apparatus.

The grand hotels have their cuisine departments as clean and neat as are the hospitals. At St. Dennis hotel the German Emperor's cheff, who is an expert on dietetics, was much impressed with the system of New York hotel kitchens. The chefe proposes to introduce one new dish to the Emperor's table—clam chowder. They will have to import the little neck clams from America, there being none in Europe. The kitchens in New York's first class hotels are lined with porcelain and marble, and have an army of employes drilled like soldiers.

The oyster fishery is a great industry here from New York to Chesepeake Bay. There are over two hundred ships engaged in this work. The oysters are fished out of the bay, and along New Jersey coast at the rate of five bushels every six minutes.
