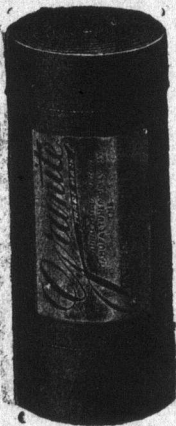

Importers.**FLOORING COLLAPSED**Crowd at Corner-Stone Laying  
Precipitated Into Cellar.

Sixty Persons Have Nasty Fall at Wilkes-Barre—Bishop Hoban of Scranton Gets Severe Shaking—Accident Due to Insufficient Bracing—Injured Rescued With Ladders By the Police.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., May 31.—At the laying of the corner-stone of St. Mary's Greek Catholic Church yesterday, a temporary flooring collapsed, precipitating about 60 persons into the cellar, 12 feet below.

For over an hour the utmost excitement prevailed. The screams of those in the wreckage and the groans from the injured could be heard for a block away. Ladders were obtained from neighboring factories, and with the aid of the police, the injured were removed from their perilous position. Some were able to walk to their homes. Others were removed to hospitals in ambulances.

The accident, it is said, was due to insufficient bracing beneath the new floor.

Bishop Hoban of Scranton, who went down with the wreckage, was at first reported to be seriously hurt. He was soon rescued by friends and removed to a place of safety. He was badly shaken up, but escaped injury.

**CAMPAIGN IN WEST YORK.**

Suddenness of Campaign Hardly Appreciated By Electorate.

Toronto, May 31.—Canvassers in the West York campaign report a surprising lack of knowledge among electors that a contest is imminent in this riding.

The speed with which the vacancy in the local House is being filled is believed to be mainly responsible for this, as it has allowed little time for public meetings. The election takes place to-morrow (Saturday). The riding comprises Etobicoke and Vaughan and York Township west of Yonge street, the towns of Toronto Junction and the villages of Weston and Woodbridge.

The candidates are Dr. Godfrey, Conservative; Eaten William, independent, and F. J. Peel, Socialist.

**SHOT SISTER AND SELF.**

Two Little Girls Found Dead In River

Springfield, Ill., May 31.—Carrie Lederbrand, 7 years old, and her sister Cora, 17 years old, daughters of Joseph Lederbrand, a farmer, were murdered and thrown into Sugar Creek Wednesday, and the bodies were found that night by the girls' father.

The girls left home early in the afternoon.

Dr. Duncan found that each girl had a bullet hole in the right temple. It is believed that Cora shot her invalid sister Carrie and then killed herself. Cora had often complained that she was unable to associate with other girls because she had to care for Carrie.

**SHOT AT BISHOP.**

Attempted Assassination Foiled By Young Priest.

Lublin, Russia, May 31.—An attempt was made to assassinate Bishop Yatshevsky, of the Catholic church.

A man, who subsequently was identified as a socialist agitator, who had twice been imprisoned, fired several shots from a revolver at the Bishop while the latter was walking through a street here and then attacked him with a dagger, slightly wounding the prelate.

The latter's life was saved by a priest, who sprang before the Bishop. The would-be assassin was captured by the police.

**COTTON SHIP AFIRE.**

Reaches Port With Cargo Ablaze and Decks Crumbling.

Hamilton, Bermuda, May 31.—The British steamer Boniface from Galveston for Liverpool arrived here yesterday morning with her cargo of cotton on fire.

The Boniface carried nine passengers, eight of whom are women. The flames were discovered May 26, when the vessel was 700 miles from Bermuda. The hatches were battened down and the Boniface was headed for the island. When she arrived here her cargo was burning furiously and her decks were crumbling in.

**Cow Runs Amuck.**

Exeter, May 31.—While 300 children were dispersing from school a cow, being led by a young man, got enraged, charged into the crowd. It carried one boy for a distance on both horns and threw him to the ground, and then pinned a 12-year-old girl named Welch to a fence. The horns, however, escaped her body, but she had a leg broken.

**Forger Being Deported.**

Ottawa, May 31.—Geo. Shenton, who, on May 18, presented a forged cheque for \$60, bearing Nelson D. Porter's name, has been ordered to be deported by the Dominion Government. He will be put on board the steamship Ionian.

He came from Yorkshire, Eng., about ten months ago.

**Election Not Yet.**

Ottawa, May 31.—There will be no general election this year," stated W. S. Calvert, M.P., chief Liberal whip yesterday.

"We gave our word to the leader of the Opposition that there would be another session before dissolution and it holds good."

Race Train Derailed.  
New York, May 31.—Several persons were injured, none fatally, when a Long Island train was derailed at the Belmont Park race track station yesterday afternoon.

Queen of Norway Has Narrow Escape In Paris.

Paris, May 30.—While King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway were driving in the park of Versailles yesterday, accompanied by President and Mme. Fallieres, the leading horse attached to the carriage containing the Queen and Mme. Fallieres suddenly reared while crossing a small bridge and jumped over the parapet into the water, dragging the postilion over the bridge.

The two ladies were somewhat alarmed, but happily they did not sustain any injury.

The postilion was dragged out of the water, none the worse for his wetting, another horse was attached to the carriage and the party proceeded.

As a souvenir of their visit to the French Government has presented to their Norwegian majesties a gobelin tapestry, some fine engravings from Louvre, and several Sevres vases. M. Fallieres has decided to go to Norway during the summer and return King Haakon's visit.

It is entirely probable that his trip will be extended to include England, Denmark and other countries, whose sovereigns have been guests of the French republic.

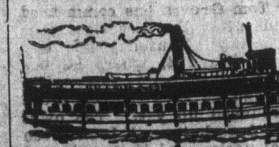
