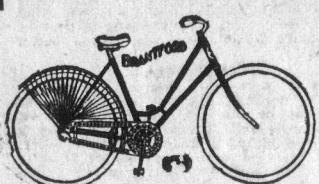

THE RUSSIAN STRIKE IS OFF

The People Will Wait Until
Government is Less and
Country Prepared

WHY DOUMA DISSOLVED

St. Petersburg, July 26.—All indications point to the postponement of the threatened general strike until the Government shall be less and the country more prepared for such an event, until the harvest is finished and the revolutionary movement develops spontaneously among the idlers. News from the provinces yesterday indicates that conditions in the famine districts scarcely are ripe for an upheaval. The strategists of the revolutionary councils are seeking to defer the call for a general strike until it can come as a supplement to the movement already under way. A definite decision will be reached within a day or two in the reorganized council of workmen.

Premier Stolypin announced to the Council of the Empire yesterday that he had obtained from Emperor Nicholas special powers for Admiral Skrydloff in restoring and maintaining order and discipline in the Black Sea fleet.

Why Douma Was Dissolved.
Premier Stolypin last night authorized the official St. Petersburg agency to issue this statement to the foreign press:

"From the very first days of its existence the Lower House overstepped all the limits of the law in its reply to the speech from the throne, a modification of the fundamental law was demanded in the shape of suppression of the council of the empire, and the creation of a responsible cabinet. By its agrarian program, based on the expropriation of the land, the House missed hopes that could not be realized and weakened the respect for the property of others, already enfeebled. In the speeches of its members the House consistently discredited the government, accusing it of organizing programs and disorders. By sending a deputation to Bialystok it openly aspired to usurp executive power."

Fourteen deputies appealed to the people, inciting disorder, a step which called forth no expression of disapproval from the House. In the last moment of its existence the House declared the Government had acted illegally in explaining to the population the nature of the agrarian project proposed by itself, and decided to address a manifesto to the people persuading them not to believe in the Government regarding the question, but to await its settlement by Parliament. Several members also undertook journeys to the interior of Russia with the object of supporting agitation, their appearance being followed by renewed disorders, pogroms and strikes. All these causes necessitate the decision to dissolve the House."

Submit to Czar.
Count Heyden, Prince Lvoff, and M. Stokovich, the three members of Parliament who refused to sign the address to the country issued at Viborg, July 23, yesterday issued a separate address, appealing to the people to submit quietly to the imperial decree dissolving Parliament, and to prepare for the elections of members to the new Parliament. The address points out that the Emperor acted within his constitutional rights under the fundamental law, and says that the signing of the address is offering this advice as from the profound conviction that it would be a crime in the midst of the present dangers to attempt to shake the power of the sovereign.

Daring Assassination.
Warsaw, Russian Poland, July 26.—Colonel Salamatoff, of the gendarmerie, was stabbed to death yesterday. The assassin escaped.
Salamatoff, who was assistant to the chief of gendarmes of the Province of Warsaw, had been active in the repressive measures. He was walking in the street, when he was attacked by two men, who stabbed him several times, and then walked quickly away in different directions, without interference from the spectators.

CRISIS MAY BE RESULT

Psychological Moment Has
Not Been Found by
Earl Grey

TALK OF CONFEDERATION

St. John's, Nfld., July 26.—Earl Grey's visit to this colony, coupled with the reported confederation negotiations between him and Governor McGregor of Newfoundland, has caused intense excitement here. After repeated attempts to get up a public reception to Earl Grey, backed by the inside influence of the Governor and Sir Edward Morris, the committee selected have been unable to get the public to take hold, and at the last meeting only five of the committee were present.

Functions Abandoned.
Mr. Outerbridge occupied the chair. He read a report from the committee who had charge of the guarantee fund. They reported that they had received only 16 instead of 40 guarantors, and that general apathy existed to the plan of a ball or reception being held. Leading public men and citizens would not guarantee expenses, and it is said all public functions will be abandoned, and Earl Grey will be received the same as a private guest of the Governor.

There is much feeling in Government circles and amongst anti-confederate politicians, who look upon the whole matter as a scheme to force confederation.

Crisis Coming.

The Premier, Sir Robert Bond, has been compelled to issue a statement that he had nothing to do with the visit. It is believed a crisis may result. Sir Edward Morris, Attorney-General in the Bond Government, while the Premier was absent from the colony, openly endorsed Governor McGregor's invitation and advocated before a public meeting a popular reception to Earl Grey. It is believed trouble is likely between Governor McGregor and his Government as a result of the Premier's implied repudiation of Governor McGregor for inviting Earl Grey.

Talked Union.

It is also noteworthy that while Governor McGregor has been charged with negotiating with the Canadian Governor-General on the subject of confederation he does not deny that the subject was discussed with Earl Grey. Present indications are of trouble for the Governor and Government.

There is strong anti-confederation feeling here now.

ADOPT CANADIAN PLAN.

U. S. Finds It Satisfactory as Regards Contract Wages.

WORK FOR GRAIN COMMISSION.

All Matters Concerning Inspection Come Within Scope.

Ottawa, July 26.—The Grain Trade Commission has received its instructions. The allowance of the chairman is \$15 per diem and each of the two commissioners get \$12. They are to be allowed such contingencies traveling and living expenses as the Minister of Trade and Commerce may deem necessary.

The commission has been instructed to take into consideration all matters connected with the grain inspection, and the Manitoba grain act, and is given power to visit grain growers and elevators all over the wheat growing area to enquire into the methods of handling, distribution of cars, grading and handling at ports.

Lightning Destroys Church.

Chambers, Department of Saviole, France, July 26.—A cloudburst, accompanied by lightning, yesterday destroyed the Church of Les Chevenettes, about 35 miles from here, melting the church bells into a solid mass, injuring a number of persons and causing an enormous amount of damage along the Franco-Italian border. Railway traffic by way of Mont Cenis is interrupted.
