Odd Fellows Assemble To So Say C. M. A. At Their Meeting Being Held At Winnipeg

AN IMPRESSIVE EVENT MANY MATTERS COME UP

Winnipeg, Sept. 19.—The manufac-turers' convention devoted yesterday to reports of committees. Only two re-ports were received in the afteracon, that of railways and transportation and

that of railways and transportation and intelligence committees.

A. Saunders of Goderich moved the adoption of the intelligence committee report, which was unanimously carried. He referred to the fact that the Canadian manufacturers had not availed them selves of the opportunity offered them for export trade, and advised them to devote more attention to this branch in the future.

Hugh Blain presented the railway and transportation committee report.

Freight Rates Excessive.

A lengthy discussion took place in connection with the resolution regarding a New Zealand steamship service.

ing a New Zealand steamship service.
J. O. Thorne and W. H. Henderson opposed the resolution advocating the shipping of goods across the continent. shipping of goods across the continent. They claimed that freight was shipped cheaper from the head of the great lakes eastbound via the New York route than by rail west. They said the New York route was at present imperative, and advocated, instead of shipping by rail to Vancouver and hence to New Zealand, the establishment of a steamship line from an eastern point.

eastern point.

J. Prender of St. John addressed the meeting regarding freight rates. He said rates were generally excessive in the Dominion. He emphasized the retarding influence these fates would have in the growth of the country unless steps were taken immediately to keep them within reasonable bounds.

Technical Education.

The proceedings in the morning were of general interest, chiefly, perhaps, on account of outspoken opinion of some of the delegates on the neglect of technical education in the public schools, and also in more advanced educational institutions. Much regret was expressed that foreign correspondence schools should draw from young Canadians fees which run into the hundreds of thousands annually for technical instruction, which is often of doubtful value. The speakers-were of the opinion that what was taught in the United states was capable of being taught in Canada. Under present conditions the country not only lost a large sum in fees, but, because of an inefficient system of education, its industrial growth was seciously restricted.
