MANY MATTERS DEALT WITH

In all probability consider this offer when submitting their report. He then read a letter from the City Solicitor, which will be found in another part of this issue.

Ald. Stone presented a petition for a hydrant on Wade street. Referred to Property.

Ald. Austin asked for the sum of fifty dollars to be placed to the credit of the Industrial committee, to bring to the notice of the Government our educational advantages.

His Worship read a petition from Wm. Gray & Sons, M. Campbell, T. H. Taylor Co., and over two hundred other ratepayers, asking for the submission of a by-law empowering the Council to enter into an agreement with the Electric Railway Company for the construction of a new bridge at Third street.

Ald. Stone—The benefits that merchants and others are getting by the construction of the road have been widespread and he was not in favor of exacting the "pound of flesh," but was willing to meet the management in a liberal spirit, and was in favor of submitting a by-law.

Ald. Elmondson also favored the by-law, but thought the Company should bear the expense.

Ald. Potter—Before the by-law is submitted the matter should be discussed by the Railway committee and the managers of the road in order to arrive at some definite understanding.

Ald. Austin—I realize what a great benefit the road has been to the merchants and citizens generally, but before submitting any by-law it must be put on such a basis that there is a probability of its being acceptable to the people. He was satisfied the ratepayers wanted to act generously towards the road and to offer the management every reasonable facility for doing a profitable business, so that the Company and the municipality can get every possible benefit from the enterprise; but at the present time the Council cannot comply with the demands of the Company. It will be necessary for the Railway committee to have more definite terms before an agreement could be reached to submit the by-law asked for in the petition.

Ald. Scullion—We are not in a position to discuss this matter intelligently. It is a business proposition in which both parties are expected to reap a benefit, and a definite proposal will have to be submitted together with the cost. He moved that the matter be referred to the Railway committee. Carried.

Council adjourned.

THE CODE OF HONOR.

Duelling as it Was in France in the Time of Richelieu.

The passion for duelling, which had cost France, it was said, between 7,000 and 8,000 lives during the twenty years of Henry IV's reign, was at its height when his son came to the throne. The council of Trent in 1545 had solemnly condemned the practice of single combat, impartially including principals, seconds and spectators in its penalty of excommunication. In 1602 an edict of Henry pronounced the "damnable custom" of duelling introduced by the corruption of the century to be the cause of so many piteous accidents, to the extreme regret and displeasure of the king and to the irreparable damage of the state, "that we should count ourselves unworthy to hold the scepter if we delayed to repress the enormity of this crime."

A whole series of edicts followed to the same effect, but it was easier to make edicts than to enforce them. Degradation, imprisonment, confiscation of property, loss of civil rights and death were the penalties attached to the infringement of the law against duelling, and still the practice prevailed. In 1626 Richelieu published a milder form of prohibition. The first offense was no longer capital, a third only of the offender's property was to be confiscated, and the judges were permitted to recognize extenuating circumstances.

A few months later the Comte de Bouteville thought fit to test the minister's patience in this direction. The Place Royale had long been a favorite dueling ground, and De Bouteville traveled from Brussels to fight his twenty-second duel here, in the heart of Paris, in deliberate defiance of the king's authority. The result was not encouraging. Montmorency though he was, the count went with his second to the scaffold, and the marked decrease from that time in the number of duels may be attributed either to the moderation used in framing the law or to the inexorable resolution with which it was enforced.

HEAD SEVERED FROM BODY.

Most Brutal Murder of a Farmer Reported From Halifax.

Halifax, Feb. 6.—The decapitated body of Freeman Harvie, a well-known farmer of Ellershouse, Hants Co., on the line of Dominion Atlantic Railway, was found in the cellar of his house yesterday morning. The head was completely severed from the trunk, and there seems to be no doubt that a most brutal murder has been committed. The facts, so far revealed, are as follows:

Harvie was last seen on Saturday. It is known that on that day a stranger, an Englishman, called at the farm to discuss the question of his purchase. This man has disappeared, and the police are searching for him.

The ghastly discovery of the dead man's body was made yesterday morning by neighbors, who, knocking and getting no response, forced an entrance.

Harvie's farm is about a mile from Ellershouse. He lived alone there, his wife being employed in the cotton factory at Windsor.

The body when found yesterday morning lay underneath a heap of potatoes.

Late last night George Stanley, who says he came from London, England, was arrested and placed in the hands of the sheriff to stand trial for the crime, and James Fisher of Ellershouse is also a prisoner.

It is likely also that other arrests will follow before the police decide that they have all in their clutches who may have had something to do with the murder.

Several local men may have plotted to secure the money which Harvie was known to have, taking advantage of the fact that he was living alone.

Owen Sound Land Syndicate.

Winnipeg, Feb. 6.—An Owen Sound, Ont., land syndicate have disposed of large sections of Saskatchewan and Alberta lands to New York and Ohio farmers, who will locate on it this spring. There are about 15,000 settlers assured for the west through this source alone.

Canadian Mining Institute.

Quebec, Feb. 6.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Mining Institute will be held at the Chateau Frontenac, on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, March 7, 8 and 9. It is expected that at least one hundred delegates from all parts of the Dominion will be present.

McGill For British Columbia.

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 6.—The bill establishing McGill as the state-recognized university of British Columbia passed yesterday the second reading. There was much opposition, led by Toronto University graduates.

Five Years For Stealing Nine Cents.

Binghamton, N. Y., Feb. 6.—For stealing nine cents, Daniel Fitzgerald was sentenced by Judge Parsons to Auburn prison for five years.
