WILLIS ON TRIAL.

Mrs. Covell Says Now Man Who Searched For Her Didn't Look Like Accused.

St. Thomas, Nov. 2.—The trial of Alexander Willis for the murder of Eliza Lowry at Rodney, on April 19 last, was begun yesterday afternoon. last, was begun yesterday afternoon.
Willis was arraigned, and pleaded not guilty. He is quite self-possessed, and looks well. He is defended by C. St. Clair Leitch of Dutton, while G. Lynch Staunton of Hamilton is Crown prosecutor. Mrs. Covell was placed on the witness stand, and gave substantially the same evidence as at the inquest and the preliminary trial. She, too is self possessed and deliberate. Her evidence occupied the court until close evidence occupied the court until closing time. The Crown is said to have
no evidence. The case is expected to
last all to-day, perhaps longer. There
is a preponderance of St. Thomas men
on the jury.

Says It Was Not Willis.

Mrs. Covell walked slowly into court,
supporting herself with a crutch, and
was sworn. She repeated her former
evidence In one important point how.

evidence. In one important point, how ever, she varied her former story. Af-ter swearing in her principal evidence that the man who searched for her under the bed had a face like that of Willis, on cross-examination, she stated positively that it was not Willis at

John Macpherson of Rodney told of being with Willis at the Binder Hotel, where they had four drinks between and 10 o'clock the night previous to the murder. John Hughes, one of the proprietors of the hotel, testified that Willis procured a 35-cent flask of whiskey on the night of April 18. Willis wore a black felt hat, a soft one. Duncan Macpherson also testified to having seen Willis at the hotel, but that he was perfectly sober. Daniel D. Campbell and James M. Rebertson gave unimportant evidence. William Flater, who owns a sawmill at Rodney, and who was the last person ney, and who was the last person known to have seen Willis prior to the crime, swore that he overtook the prisoner about 10.30, and he then appeared to be slightly intoxicated. Willis broke the bottle, and they had a drink. They talked quite a while. They drank about half the liquor in the bottle. Thomas C. Campbell testified that Willis had stated at the inquest that he had reached his home about 12

o'clock, and did not again leave until next morning.

They Saw a Man. Dr. Wilbur Harvey of Rodney told of being out the Furnwall road, and that about 11.30 that night he passed the Covell house and saw a man standing at the gate. The man was about 5 feet 10, and appeared to have come from the house. He wore an overcoat, but witness could not tell the color. He had on what looked like a

color. He had on what looked like a hard hat with a dinge in it. The man was about the same build as Willis. William Cole, who lives not far from the scene of the tragedy, said Willis lived a mile and a half east of his place; had known Willis about 15 years. He saw Willis between 6 and 1 ofclock the morning after the tra-7 o'clock the morning after the tragedy. Saw Willis going east towards his own farm. He was positive it was Willis. Cole's evidence was the last taken when court adjourned.
