VERY INTERESTING SUGGESTIONS BEARING
ON THE PRESENT SITUATION.
TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN.

DEAR ACADIAN,—If you can find
space and think it worth while you
may publish my impressions (or some
of them) in the election contest now
in progress.

And first a few remarks referring to
that Liberal rally of Sept. 20th in the
rink in Wolfville. I did not get there
in time to hear the two earlier speak-
ers, but as Sir Frederick was to be the
chief speaker I was comfortably seated
before he began his address. I had
right to expect a dignified address,
as coming from a Federal Minister of
large experience and mature years.
But Sir Frederick had first to deal
with that old slander case (not the old,
old one) the Rye Opener story. It
took him a long time to get through
with the affair and make clear to the
audience that he had read the great-
est newspaper in the world into an
apology, and a cash payment of \$25,000.
When he came to reading the scribble
document he waxed eloquent, and
brought rounds of applause from the
hiring stampers gathered in for the
occasion. Most of us there knew the
whole story before—and even more
than Sir Fred repeated; and in listen-
ing to the rhapsody felt more keenly
than ever the humiliated of Kings
county, through our representative.
Glad enough when the Dr. was
through with that. Now we will surely
have talk that will reduce the hour
waste to waste.

He next dealt with that organiza-
tion called the Kings Co. Temperance
Alliance—or as he called it a 'wall of
the wisp.' His text for this subject
was an 'Alliance' meeting held at
Kings Co. House, Wolfville, N. S., on
Sept. 10, 1908.

Dr. Shoop's chief speaker, FRANK
ACADIAN of last week showed how utterly
false and misleading were the
references to the address of Dr. Shear.
The facts as gathered from Dr.
Shear and others are the exact oppo-
site of what Sir Fred tried to con-
vey. A large number of the audience
knew this to be the case, and felt most
keenly the added humiliation of such
lack of the essential element in our
representative.

I might say just here that the use
that Dr. Borden and his organ at
Kentville makes of Dr. Crowell's
name is also false and misleading. Dr.
Crowell is an active and valued mem-
ber of the Kings County Temperance
Alliance, and helped to frame that
platform setting forth the attitude and
aims of the Alliance in this contest.
Sir Frederick's attempted vilification
and sarcasm at this stage brought
rounds of noisy demonstration from
the stamping brigade, who evidently
were determined to earn their wages
agreed upon.

There was some reluctance shown,
however, when Sir Fred related in his
cynical style the fact that the afore-
said Canning meeting of Alliance was
opened by singing that, to many of
our best people, inspiring hymn, 'Be-
cause the perishing.' The speaker paused
here, evidently expecting loud
applause,—but this was too much
even for the brigade, and he had to
proceed without it. Blame on the
man that attempts to bring ridicule
and contempt on an organization
which is built on the Bible as a work-
ing code of rules, which aims only at
developing Christian citizenship, and
is a common working-ground for all

men from abroad as Dr. Shear-
son has repeatedly bid the Alliance
spread in the present contest—say-
ing that 'the electing of Mr.
Shoop would mean a moral victory,
winning this whole province—yes,
winning Dominion from the Atlan-
tic to the Pacific.' In our own county
the Alliance has the approval and ac-
tive-operation of our ministers and
best church workers, and the
majority is 'The sword of the Lord
is Gideon.'

And I follow Sir Frederick through
his whole labored effort and show from
start to finish that the Alliance is
not a representative who has made it
a hissing and a by-word from the
Atlantic to the Pacific.

The climax was reached when Sir
Frederick announced the contempla-
ted gift to this town of a splendid
building for post office, custom house,
etc., and also free rural mail deliv-
ery. Has the man lost his senses or
even his cunning? Has he so low an
estimate of the honesty and intelli-
gence of Wolfville as to think he can
buy these with their own money? To
quote from a leading religious paper
of Toronto: 'The money to be expend-
ed on any public works or buildings
in any constituency, is not the prop-
erty of a government, but of the
people. It is impertinent and immoral
for any member of the government to
hold on the people's own money as a
prize to be given for political support.
If a public work is needed in any part
of the country, it should be construct-
ed without reference to the political
complexion of the district. If it is not
constructed the government have been
reunited in their duty and worthy of
blame. If the work is question is not
needed, it should not be constructed,
and if it is constructed it return for
political support, the government has
acted wastefully and dishonorably.'

The above is the only principle that
should regulate the expenditure of
public money and yet in this town
of Wolfville we are offered this build-
ing at a time and in a way that will
best be understood by the people. It is
not a bribe for support of Sir Fredrick
on the 20th. He adds with added fervor:
'Gentlemen, use your common sense.
I am going to be elected; and the govern-
ment is as sure to be returned to
power as that the sun will rise tomor-
