A Tovonto despatch of Thursday night says:—Adelaide Davis, a domestic servant, came here about three months ago from Sarnia, without the knowledge of her parents. She has been despondent of late, and this afterneon she was found dead in the rooms of J. Sutherland commercial traveller, with whom she has been keeping company. She had poisoned herself. She was about 23 years of age. She left a note saying no blame was attached to Sutherland, but that she had taken her life because she was in trouble. Sutherland has been arrested.

At the inquest held on Friday a sad history was revealed of betrayal and seduction, and the subsequent shame of the unfortunate girl, who rather than meet her aged father swallowed the fatal dose. Sutherland, in whose room Miss Davis died, was completely absolved of any criminality. He was regarded by the suicide as a friend.

Spanish Republicans Bestir-ring Themselves. MADRID, Jan. 1.—At a banquet given by republicans in honor of Senor Zorilla, the speakers, representing a majority of those present, urged a revolution against the government. The minority, headed by Senor Salmeron, an eminent republican leader, protested against violence and strongly urged that help be sought from the moderates. A band of republican revolutionists made an attempt to day to destroy the railway bridge in the Sierra Morena mountains. Five members of the band have been arrested. It is reported that several persons have been arrested and imprisoned at Cuidad Real on suspicion of being implicated in a revolutionary conspiracy.

ry conspiracy. Jerry Trayis's Justice. CALGARY, Dec 30.—The sentence in the Cayley case was delivered yesterday before a densely packed court room. The Judge said the case had given him great anxiety, and affirmed the belief that Cayley was at heart disposed to be conciliatory, but that he had been urged on by illadvisers and wicked men. In order that these men should bear the penalty instead of Cayley, he imposed a sentence of \$400 fine, \$100 counsel fee to the Crown prosecutor, and costs, to be paid by Monday next, failing which Cayley would be sentenced to three months' imprisonment and next, tailing which Cayley would be seen extra the sense to three months' imprisonment and \$200 fine, and if the fines are not paid at the expiration of three months that the prisoner remain in jail until paid. The neople are anxious to pay the fine, but Cayley refuses. He will go to prison and remain there until a commission from Ottawa investigates the matter.

A Set Back to the Tories.

MONTREAL, Dec. 31.—Bishop Fabre has addressed the following circular to his clergy: "Since the publication of my mandement of the 17th inst. I have been informed from different sources that a wrong interpretation had been given to my words. So that none of you may be deluded by these exaggerations, I here declare that I have not the intention of discussing the political object of agistators, against whom I warned the population. I do not at all enter the political arena. I deplore those methods of tumultuous demands having a revolutionary aspect. The scenes which were enacted in Montreal on the subject of vaccination and what followed therefrom and other scenes which Meatreal and several places in the country witnessed and in which effigy-burning was practised on a large scale—all these spectacles are of those which we must deplore, This is what I have done without attempting to enter into political significance which were pullers wished to give them."

A Montreal despatch says: Bishop Fabre's Vicar General, Marchest, in reading the mandement, stated emphatically that it bore no political significance for either party one way or the other, and that His Lordship wished this to be distinctly understood by all the faithful.
