THE WHEAT AREA OF ENGLAND.

The following report of the
average of wheat in England is
made by the Globe, London, Eng-
land: Thirty-six years ago in 1868,
the acreage was 3,500,000 acres;
in 1895, 1,400,000 acres; in 1904,
1,375,000 acres. In 1882 England
grew more wheat than barley or
oats. This year they have grown
about four times as much of either
as of wheat. The whole wheat-
growing area of England might be
crowded into the second largest
county, and still have some room
to spare.

Government May

Establish Agricultural Schools and
Model Farms in West.

As an outcome of Sir Richard
Cartwright's trip to western Canada,
this fall he became impressed with the
desirability of establishing an agri-
cultural school and model farms
throughout Manitoba and the Territo-
ries as a means of spreading a knowledge
of scientific agriculture on the prairies.
The minister of trade and commerce
urges strongly that unless the farmers
devote their time to something more
than wheat raising alone, their lands
will soon be exhausted as has already
happened with many of the farmers to
the south of the international border.
