RIVAL TO KRAMER.
Frank L. Kramer, for thirteen con-
secutive years the American cycle
racing champion, is now in greater
danger of being shorn of his title
than at any time in his career. And
it looks as though Kramer's old
throne is to be occupied by a for-
eigner—Alfred Timothy Goulet, of
Australia.

Goulet is a youngster in the game.
He is not yet twenty-three years old,
but this season he has shown the
speed, the endurance and the cunning
of a champion. Today he
stands tied with Kramer for first
place in the American championship
points table, each having scored 21
points for this season. Walter Rutt
world's champion, is third with 9
points, and it is evident that the
championship lies between Goulet
and Kramer.

CANADA'S CHANCE NOW
Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 29—Mr. Harris
Wilson, the Canadian trade commis-
sioner in London, points out in a
report to the department of trade
and commerce that there are many
lines which Canadian manufacturers

BELGIUM FOUGHT
IN EARLY DAYS

Special war despatch to Nanaimo
Herald (Delayed in transmission)
Brussels, Aug. 28, 57 B. C.—Horum
omnium fortissimi sunt Belgae pro-
ximique sunt Germanis, qui trans
Rhenum incolunt, quibusum contin-
entes bellum gerunt.

Of all the nations the Belgians
are the bravest. They are living
close to the Germans who dwell be-
yond the Rhine and with whom they
carry on a continual warfare.

GERMAN TREACHERY
WAS AMPLY REPAID

Paris, Aug. 2—Among the prisoners
who have just died in a hospital
at Troyes, department of Aube, says
the Petit Troyes, was a lieutenant of
the 135th German infantry whose
company had sustained severe losses
at the hands of the French troops
and had been ordered to surrender.

When the French soldiers approach-
ed to disarm the Germans the latter
separated to let through their ranks
a machine gun which had been hidden
behind and which poured a murderous
fire into the ranks of the advancing
Frenchmen.

Exasperated by this treachery, says
the paper, the French troops charged
furiously with fixed bayonets and ex-
terminated the Germans with the
exception of the lieutenant, who
survived for a few days with his
jaw fractured and his tongue cut
off.
