OF WOOD.

Made Into Pulp by The Mills of The United States Last Year.

Washington, June 14 .- Two hun dred and fifty-one putp mills in the United States used 3.346.106 cords of wood, and made 2,118,047 tons of pulp leading pulp wood, and it furnished sixty per cent, of the total quantity

pulp industry in the last ten years spruce insufficient to meet the deportations from Canada have beer neavy. In 1908 our pulp mills coneords of domestic spruce, and over 670,000 cords of imported spruce, making the imports of spruce forty-five per cent. of the domestic supply.

Next to sprue, the most important of it were converted into pulp last mestic origin, and most of it was produced in the lake states and Pennsylvania. Altho now used in less quantities than spruce and hemlock, poplar has long been a standard pulp imported, but by far the larger portion of the more than 300,00 cords used Spruce, hemlock and poplar made up ninety per cent, of the total quantity of pulp wood used. remainder was supplied by many pecies, the most important of which ere pine, cottonwood and balsam.

The wood used by the pulp mill last year cost them little more than \$28,000,000, or an average of \$8.21 per ord against in average of \$8.21 in was imported spruce, with an average value of \$10.60 per cord. The cheapest wood which was used in large quantitles was hemlock, the cost being \$6.02 per cord.

Owing to the onditions the total consumption of oulp wood in 1908 was nearly 16 per ent less than in 1907, but this did not prevent a considerable increase in B. Thomas, W. B. Snowball. the price of wood.

The high price of wood is making the manufacturers be constantly on the lookout for cheaper raw material and one of the most encouraging developments has been the increased us of slab wood and other saw mill waste.
