

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption
may take a purchased homestead in certain
districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutles—Must
reside six months in each of three years,
cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth
\$500.00.
