What The Daylight Saving Plan Means

It is proposed to atilize during early morning sunlight which is now often wasted while we sleep, and thereby, to add an hour's sunlight at the end of the day.

This is to be accomplished by mor ing the hands of the cleck forward an hour on the first day of May and backward one hour on the first Sun This will entail:

1.-No earlier rising than at presnt, because we shall continue to ise at the same hour by the clock.

The chief advantage to be gained s that we should have daylight for an hour later every evening during the summer months. This would be most valuable in May, June, July August and September.

The effect of the scheme would be to make the day fit man's requirements more closely. We would simply add one h ar each day to the daylight available for rest and recreation after our day's work finished

LIVE STOCK—The herds and flocks of Europe have been greatly reduced. When the war is over there will be a great demand for breeding stock. Canadian farmers should keep this in mind.

MEATS—In-1915 Great Britain imported 664,508 tons of beef, mutton and lamb, of which 364,245 tons came from without the Empire. Out of 430,420 tons of beef only 104,967 tons came from within the Empire.

The demands of the Allies for frozen beef, canned beef, bacon and hams will increase rather than diminish. Orders are coming to Canada. The decreasing tonnage space available will give Canada an advantage if we have the supplies.

DAIRYING—Home con and cheese has increased of late years. The war demands for cheese have been unlimited. The Canadian cheese exports from Montreal in 1915 were nearly \$6,500,000 over 1914. Prices at Montreal-Cheese: January 1915, 151/4 to 17 cents; January 1916, 181/4 to 181/2 cents. Butter: January 1915, 24 to 2834 cents; January 1916, 32 to 33 cents.

EGGS—Canada produced \$30,000,000 worth of eggs in 1915 and helped out Great Britain in the shortage. Shippers as well as producers have a duty and an opportunity in holding a place in that market.
