

ouble the losses sustained in any re-war year, but it is pointed out that the increased cost of the commodities stolen, roughly estimated to verage 85 per cent. must be taken to consideration when comparing ne losses in the days of low prices ith losses now. Nevertheless there as been a steadily increasing numer of packages stolen, and the orave met an increased ingenuity in fverting goods from their owners. A technique of robbery has been eveloped so highly that the methods f "master thieves" are similar in he United States, England, France, taly and Argentina, according to a secent report of the United States hamber of Commerce in Argentina. Detectives, however, are inclined or discredit that organization's pelief that a "widespread interna-

ional organization" is at work stealing merchandise.
