## LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The sugar crop in the Philippines is being harvested owing to the lack of labor.

MR. M. TRAINOR, agent of Imperial Insurance Company has just returned from a very handsome calendar.

SEKOR Ramon Meliza has been elected President of the Native Assembly at Iloilo, Philippine Islands.

FOURTEEN persons were killed in the gas explosion in the Palla Mine, near Manarow Spain, on Monday.

It is reported that there is a shortage of \$5000 in the accounts of the town of Summerside. The town clerk is missing.

THE bubonic plague has broken out at St. Louis, an island of the Mauritius. Several cases have been found.

The United States government will send three companies of soldiers to the Copper River district in the spring to open up a mail route to the Yukon.

FORMER Attorney-General Garland, of the United States, fell dead from apoplexy while addressing the Supreme Court at Washington, on Thursday.

A SMALL boiler on the cruise New York now in the Brooklyn Navy Yard, burst Thursday last, killing a man, and injuring five others.

A TERRIBLE blizzard was raging in the vicinity of Denver, Col., on Monday. Many towns were isolated and the snow was deeply drifted.

In consequence of the large amount of space occupied by our report of the proceedings of the Liberal-Conservative Conference other matters are crowded out.

THE New Brunswick Legislature has been dissolved and an appeal is to be made to the people. Nomination day will be the 11th inst., and polling will be on the 18th.

In Maine there are 17 pulp factories, and the white birch trees of that state are being cut down at the rate of 200,000,000 spools, on which are subsequently wound 50,000,000,000 yards of thread.

The postmaster at Charlottetown wishes to ascertain the address of Mrs. Lizette McMillan (widow), who lived in Haverhill, Mass., two years ago. Her husband died at Charlottetown and she has one daughter at least.

A TUNNEL railway horror occurred on Thursday last at Altoona, Pa. A gang of working men skipped from one track to another to avoid a train. The tunnel collapsed, killing three men and injuring sixteen others.

Forty thousand feet of space has been allotted to Canada by the Paris Exhibition Committee. The Dominion Government has decided to forward from each of the Dominion exhibits to the exhibition at the public expense, and to unpack and take charge of same, and afterwards to return them to Canada.

QUESTIONS arise as to his Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, who has been named by the council of public instruction of the Province of Quebec. This is because the Magdalen Islands, while geographically a part of the Province of Quebec, ecclesiastically belong to the diocese of Charlottetown.

It is reported from Ottawa that Blair's scheme for the acquisition of the Canadian Eastern Railway as a branch of the Intercolonial will be pressed by the Government at the coming session. The constitution is said to be a matter of one million dollars, although the Canadian Pacific Railway refused to take it at \$900,000.

The Dominion Atlantic Railroad Company, as well as the local police, are very much exercised over the whereabouts of David J. White, cashier of the railway company at their wharf office Boston, who, it is claimed, left the city Jan. 10th with his baggage, and has not been seen since. He is said to have been checked at the railway station where he checked trunks to New York. He probably followed them.

This total includes the sum of \$800 from the estate of the late Dr. Wall, as well as \$1,136 contributed by his Lordship Bishop McDonald, for the vaults in the basement, and for seats in the basement chapel, and the main church. The late Rev. M. J. McMahon left a bequest of \$100,000 to the Sacred Heart. The expenditure on the building during 1898 amounted to \$30,495.81.

A boy living on one of the Lake Erie Islands died a few days ago. The faculty of four started for the Canada shore with the body on Monday, and all were drowned.

We very much regret to be obliged to chronicle the death of Dr. F. J. Gillis of Summerside, which occurred quite suddenly on Sunday last. The Dr. had not been feeling very well of late; but was about as usual and attended to his patients, apparently in as good health as he had enjoyed of late. About 11 o'clock he was attacked by paralysis and at 5 in the afternoon he died. Dr. Gillis was one of the best known and most popular physicians in Prince County. He was a man of good ability and high character. For two or three years he occupied a seat in the Provincial Legislature, where he always did what he thought was in the best interest of the people irrespective of party or creed. He was fifty-six years of age at the time of his death. He was married to a niece of Rev. Dr. Doyle, of Vernon River, who, with a family of eight children is left to mourn. The deceased was a brother of Very Rev. Mr. Gillis, of Indian River. We tender our deepest sympathy to his bereaved family and friends.
