Not Yet Found.

The engine and car that were out on the Placentia line, being used by a gang of Placentia men on the search for John Dunn, came back to that town at 7.30 last night. The searchers failed to find the man, but they did find his cap, coat and vest near the track not far from Villa Marie station. A message was sent to the Premier to this effect with a request that the engine be again placed at the disposal of the search party again to-day in order to carry

on the quest. This was done accordingly and a volunteer party of fifty men left Placentia this morning to spend the whole day searching in the locality where his clothing was found. It is surmised that he became delirious with typhoid and wandered into the woods.

Stricken With Typhoid

A few days ago a man who arrived from Grand Falls went into a city office and complained of being ill. The young man to whom he spoke had typhoid some time ago and told the man that his symptoms indicated that he was developing the disease. He sent him to a doctor who corroborated what the office clerk had said. The physician ordered him to hospital, where he is now ill of the disease.

The Voyage of the S. S. Beothic.

The s.s. Beothic, which arrived here yesterday from Boston, will lay up to be thoroughly cleaned and overhauled. Mr. Whitney, who came here, went to Brigus to-day where he will be the guest of Capt. Bob Bartlett. The summer was agreeably spent by the party cruising the western coast of Greenland and Ellesmere Land, where with the help of Eskimos they had two months' exciting work hunting walrus, musk ox, bear, foxes and Arctic hare. The ship then sailed north as far as Kane Basin, where an impenetrable barrier of ice was met and they had to turn back. The Beothic came back by way of Ellesmere Land and the party had great sport killing big game. The plan was to capture some of the animals alive for the Zoo, and for this purpose the lasso was used. Several were secured in this way, but some of them were maimed and killed in being hoisted on board. A large number of polar bears and musk oxen also fell before the rifles of Messrs. Whitney and Rainey. Being fully satisfied with the result of the trip, Capt. Bartlett left Cape York Sept. 1st for home, and reached Boston on the 11th, after touching at Bristol, Rhode Island. The live game was carefully taken on shore for the Zoological Gardens, viz., six musk oxen, two bears, two walrus and two Arctic foxes, which are now on exhibition in Bronx Park. A moving show picture man who accompanied the party secured 31,000 feet of film, showing some of the most interesting sights that are to be seen in the Arctic regions, including the hunting and capture of the wild animals. When the Beothic arrived at Boston it was found necessary to effect repairs to her bows, where heavy ice had caused several bad "squats" near the waterline. All the crew are Newfoundlanders. They are well pleased with the trip and speak in high terms of the treatment given them on the ship.

BARSA, Spain, Oct. 4.
M. Piquie, French Governor of Madagascar, announced that he is about to inaugurate an aeroplane postal service on the island.

PORT AU PRINCE, Oct. 4.
Mons. Pouget, formerly Minister of Finance in the Haitian Cabinet, has taken refuge in the French Legation. He declared that he is in fear of arrest and prefers exile.

The thirteen Japanese who were found in a district not open to foreign trade, were to-day turned over to a Japanese Consular officer who came from Thieling with an escort of Gendarmes.

PARIS, Oct. 4.
Special despatches from Ajaccio, the Capital of Corsica, state that cholera has appeared in Sardinia, and that the Corsicans fear that the epidemic will spread across the Strait of Bonifacio which separates the Islands of Sardinia and Corsica.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 4.
The first aeroplane flight over St. Petersburg was made yesterday by Lieut. Budnief, in a Farman Biplane. The aviator followed the course of the River Neva, twice circled about the spire of St. Isaac's Cathedral, and in returning passed over an island in the Finnish Gulf.

BIARRITZ, France, Oct. 4.
M. Babuteau made a splendid flight to France from Spain to France last evening. The aviator rose at San Sebastian, and directing his course between the lofty peaks of Haya and Pizquibel, followed the valley of the River Bidasoa to the sea, over which he passed to Biarritz.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 4.
Ezra P. Prentice, a Deputy Attorney General and former Assembly man, was to-day chosen Chairman of the Republican State Committee to succeed former Lieut.-Governor Timothy L. Woodruff. Mr. Prentice was nominated to his position by Lloyd G. Griscom, Chairman of the Republican County Committee, and seconded by William Barnes, Jr., of Albany.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 4.
New York to-day welcomed Cardinal Vannutelli, the Papal Legate to the late Eucharistic Congress, at Montreal, who is to officiate at the coming consecration of St. Patrick's Cathedral. The city's greeting to the Legate started on the New Jersey side of the River with the welcome extended to him by Archbishop Farley and a delegation of priests of the Diocese at Hoboken. The Legate will be a guest of Archbishop Farley at the arch-episcopal residence during his stay there.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 4.
James Rudley the only foreign aviator who had entered the Chicago-New York air race for the \$30,000 prize offered by the Chicago Evening Post and New York Times, will not fly. Telegrams from him this morning directed that his name be taken from the list of entries because of his inability to get his Bleriot Monoplane to Chicago in time. Glenn H. Curtiss volunteered the use of a Curtiss Biplane, but Rudley was unwilling to attempt the long flight in a strange machine and has withdrawn. His inability to enter his machine was due to a movers' strike in Paris, delaying its departure, and a slow boat which landed at New York one day late.

VLADKAVAKAZ, Oct. 4.
Troops sent in pursuit of the notorious brigand Zellim Khan, were ambushed by his band, and a rural captain, three officers and twelve soldiers were killed, and many others injured. Reinforcements have been sent against the outlaws, but the absence of roads in the mountain fastness hampers the operations. The depredations of Zellim Khan have been on such an extended scale that the authorities were compelled to detail three companies of Infantry and a company of Cossacks to run down the marauders. The expedition tracked the band to the border of Tiflis Province and surrounded its camp which was pitched in an almost inaccessible gorge; the soldiers succeeded in capturing Zellim's family, his cattle and much booty, but further pursuit of the outlaws resulted in a reverse when the soldiers fell into an ambush.

Tommy Burns, former heavyweight champion of the world, purposes to tour Australia with a baseball team made up of star players picked from the team of the Pacific Coast and Northwestern League. Burns has arrived in Portland from Vancouver, B. C. He has cabled his Australian agent to negotiate for the tour of the all star team.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 4.
The steamers Sant Anna and Moitke which arrived last night from Naples, are held to-day at quarantine for a rigid inspection of all on board. Leaving Naples at the height of the cholera epidemic the arrival here of these steamers has impelled the port health authorities to renewed efforts to prevent any persons showing the slightest signs of suspicious illness from entering the country.
