LONDON, May 24. Morley moved the second reading of the Veto Bill in the Lords to-day, Although emphasizing the fact that the Bill must pass the Lords as it stood, the Viscount's speech was conciliatory. He dwelt on the substantial and important powers still left in the hands of the peers. Morley. said when the Bill passed it would he open to the Government not only to consider the reconstruction of the Second Chamber, but whether some less dilatory procedure than that provided in the Veto Bill might not be desirable. He favoured the settle ment of the question of reform by greement between the political parties, but the Government would not consent to the Second Chamber's construction on the principle of resistance to their legislation. Morley concluded his address with the hop that the Peers would avoid any course which may lead the country into a great difficulty, or perhaps into grave

BUDAPEST, May 24. The first meeting of the Interna tional Committee of the Olympian Cames was held to-day. Archduke Joseph. representing the Emperor nade the speech of welcome, and in he evening gave a reception to the delegates. The chief work of the Committee is to arrange a programme for the fifth Olympian games, to be neld in Stockholm, 1912, and select a place for four years later.


