THE BOARD OF TRADE.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir—The Editor of the "Daily News" is quite angry with me for daring to criticise the report of the Board of Trade and apologise for the Board's disregard of the question of cure and cull in the following manner: "the versatility of the Board of Trade is its strong point, 'Nemesis' may wish to see it a fish's concern, but the moment it becomes that its usefulness is gone."

Here we have one of the largest fish-eries in the world, one which has since its discovery, in 1492, been dependent on the fisheries almost solely for its sustenance, one which now by its exports shows that the products of the fisheries are seven-eighths of its resources, and yet the Board of Trade must be so versatile that the principal article of commerce must be neglected and set aside. It is not so long ago that with flourish of trumpets it was noised abroad that we were to have the cull of fish arranged and the cure looked after. Has this been done? Has the Board of Trade taken the matter up and made an intelligent effort to obtain a better cure of fish? Is it not a fact that complaints have come from markets where we sell our fish that the article is not satisfactory to the buyers? Is it not true that if the French fish had been cured last year as well as in previous years we would not have got the prices in the Mediterranean that we did? The weather in France last summer was bad for fish curing, but I see that they are now experimenting with dryers and are going to put up

a superior quality of cod to what they have been doing. The Norwegians are also giving close attention to their cure, and now that they have a large catch will be dangerous competitors with us.

With the bad cure of our own fish and the probability of glutted markets, did it not behoove the Board of Trade during the long winter to deal with a matter which is as it were the life of the whole Commerce of the Island? Is the Board waiting as usual for the Government? But why the Government? Is not the Board representative of the commercial people of the country and is it not its legitimate province to deal with cure, cull and bait? I feel very disappointed, Mr. Editor, that after three years hoping the Board would take up these questions, we are no nearer proper cure, good cull and cold storage for bait. What has been done in other countries can be done here; the Lunenburg people have managed to provide storage for bait, why can't we? The Norwegians and French have adopted regular methods of cure and they have formed companies for curing fish, why can't we? I regard the question of cure as one of the greatest importance to us just now; let us continue as we are going and very soon we will find the markets refusing our fish and taking the better article. I do not object to the Board of Trade being versatile, but I do object to its giving all its time and attention to matters concerning St. John's, as mentioned in my previous letter, whilst the great interests of the country—its fisheries—are neglected.
