HOME OF THE BOYS IN BLUE.

Wednesday afternoon the Telegram reporter had the pleasure of being shown through H. M. S. Briton, at the Dock, where everything appertaining to the ship was explained to us. Our guide was very courteous and we desire to thank him for his trouble in showing us around. The ship was not always called the Briton, as is generally known, but was formerly the Calypso. However, the Admiralty wanted the name to apply to a new sea-going cutter and taking it, substituted "Briton."

She was launched on the 7th of June, 1888, at Chatham Yard, England, so that she is now 30 years old. She carried 16 guns 330 crew, made up of Commander, officers and men, an old speed of 13 knots with the engines alone, and 17 knots with sails alone, is 235 feet long, 44 broad and 15 feet draught. The Briton was a frigate of the line and was once in action. Mostly, however, she was a training ship. She was commissioned on September 21st, 1886, when officers and men went aboard, and being ready for sea. On August 28th, 1909, she was turned into a training ship "for the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve, and since then some 1,500 or 2,000 men have been trained aboard her. She has been roofed in to keep rain and snow off her, but otherwise is just the same as when built first. She is not resting on the bottom, as many people think, and could go to sea within a short notice.

The Captain's quarters are in the stern, under the poop, on the first deck. These comprise office, dining room, bed and bath rooms, etc. Adjacent to the Captain's quarters, on the same deck, are the Fleet Paymaster's offices, and here the paymaster and a staff of clerks are at work. The galley is also on the first deck and contains a large cooking (coal) range. There is a regular cook in charge of this, of course. The kitchen is on the port side of the same deck, and here, cigarettes, tobacco, fruits, tinned goods, drinks and food are sold. As there is no duty on the cigarettes and tobacco the men may purchase them much cheaper than elsewhere, and it is there they have the advantage over the military brothers-in-arms. The canteen is opened from 12 to 1 and from 4 to 5.

There are four guns aboard the ship, two on either side, all 6 inch guns. In addition there is a small portable 3-inch gun which is used for practice. Three large tanks of water are ranged along the port and starboard sides, which would be used in case of fire; they are kept continually filled. An interesting item of the first deck is a cannon that was used against St. John's by the French in 1762. It was captured by the English sailors. Possibly if this old cannon could speak it would tell many stirring tales of fighting days gone by.

On the second deck, directly under the captain's quarters, are the Fleet Paymaster's, Fleet Surgeon's and Lieutenant's quarters. Adjacent to these are the chief gunner's, and warrant officers' offices. The officers' galley is in the stern of the ship also, and a steward, and a stewardess, attend to their wants. Then comes the men's mess room. It is a large room, midships, containing six long tables, three on the port side and three on the starboard. Forward of the men's mess is the petty officers' quarters. The reserve men, or ordinary sailors sleep in hammocks in the mess room, which they hang in rows. The daily routine is as follows: At 6.25, hammock stowage, whose duty it is to stow away the hammocks, for they are taken down every day, are called and at 6.30, the men are called, and lash up their hammocks, the stowage stowing them on the first deck. At 6.45 each man has a mug of cocoa. At 7.15, the quarters clean guns, reserve men fall in, while the orderlies clean the mess room. The orderlies are two men appointed daily, whose duty is to bring the food down to the galley on the first deck down to the mess room, clean the mess room, etc. At 7.50, the gun cleaners return to the racks, and the orderlies bring the food from the galley. Breakfast is at 8 o'clock. The mess is clean, tidy and brush up for this, and at 8.45, pipes are taken out and smoked, while the orderlies and sweepers clean up mess, deck and flats. The remainder fall in, and clean up the upper decks. Prayers are at 9 o'clock, then instruction, and then the ship's company carries on work. At 10.15, stand easy; 10.30, begin again; 11.25, pack-up (i.e. stop work); and at 11.28 reserve men fall in; 11.30, clean-up decks; 11.45, orderlies go to the galley, and bring down to the mess, and place the spit kids (spittoons); dinner at 12.00; 1.05 out pipes, orderlies clean out spit kids, and clean up mess deck; 2.20, stand easy; 2.30, carry on; 3.35, pack up; the reserve men fall in at

Only half of the crew can be off at a time, each half taking alternate turns. Those who are ashore have not got to be aboard until 12, or 7 the next morning, according to when they went out. The food is as follows: Breakfast, bread and tea; Dinner, broiled beef, potatoes, turnips, cabbage, and pudding; Tea and Supper, same as breakfast. The men may purchase anything in the canteen and bring it in the mess. The ship is lighted by electricity, and the telephone is installed there. It is undoubtedly an interesting ship, and a visit to her is well worth taking.
