"Spitzbergen is not at all a no-man's land as is generally said to-day. M. Rabot says the soverignty of Norway in Spitzbergen was recognized made in 1672. The Hansa towns paid tribute to Norway for fishing in Spitzbergen for centuries. Norway con-Egypt and of Greece had doorways, the only animal that murders for the trolled the navigation and whaling in this part of the Arctic which has been looked upon as a Norwegian sea. Great Britain tried to annex Spitzbergen in 1614, but the claim was not recognized by any other state, as it was based on wrong information and after 1623 Britain abandoned the

claim to sovereignty. M. Rabot refers to the Norwegian colonization of the land (there are at present 540 Norwegians out of the whole population of 600) to the Norwegian scientific exploration of the land, and finally to the great Norwegian mining industries started in 1907 many years in advance of any other European settlement. The writer describes the German maneuvers to prevent the Spitzbergen question from heims settled in 1910, the intention hecoming manifest at the conclusion of the Brest-Litovsk treaty with Russia that Germany was prepared to take possession of Spitzbergen for itself. Summing up, M. Rabot says polltical interest as well as justice and the task of removing any cause for conflict in the Arctic sea should lead the allied powers to award Spitzbergen to Norway.—Charleston American.
