Forty-Four Years in the Service of the Public—The Evening Telegram.

Outspoken Comments by Premier Smuts on the European Situation.

Governor Walton is Suspended—The American Challenger will Undergo Repairs—Ehrenbreitstein Reported Captured by Separatists—S.S. Westmoreland and British Schooner in Distress off American Coast.

PLAIN WORDS FROM PREMIER SMUTS.

LONDON, Oct. 23. Premier Smuts of South Africa handled the European situation without gloves and called for a conference of the powers to consider the whole position in a speech to-night at a dinner attended by the South African delegation to the Imperial Conference. He attacked France for her policy and warned Great Britain and the United States against any "excessive generosity" in remission of the inter-Allied war debts which might aid in further militarisation of the continent. General Smuts asserts he had not only the right but a plain personal duty to speak frankly. "Of the great number of public men whose names stand under the peace treaty," he said, "there are only two or three who survive in power to-day. For better or worse I am one of them and the responsibility for what was done at Paris weighs heavily on my conscience, in spite of the fact that I signed it only under protest, and under the sense foreboding of future calamities, which has come only too true." The situation, he continued, was too desperate to be dealt with by any subordinate authorities or even the Reparation Commission or the Council of the League of Nations. "It is a business for principles not agents. It is vitally important that the United States should be there as an active member and bear her full weight." The principal issue for settlement by such a conference would be reduction of the total German Reparation from the one hundred and thirty-two billion gold marks fixed in 1921 to a reasonable figure, with a reasonable moratorium. On the armament question he said "people here are already beginning to be seriously alarmed about French armaments on land and in air. The French Government has lent large sums to smaller European states around Germany, mainly with a view of feeding their ravenous military appetites," while he was at total disagreement with the French policy General Smuts felt profound sympathy with the people of France who sincerely felt they were going to get Reparations out of the Ruhr adventure and had no deliberate intention of breaking up Germany. Breach of the proposed American-British guarantee for her security had let France down badly, he said. No wonder they were led to adopt the policy of force as an alternative.

EHRENBREITSTEIN REPORTED CAPTURED.

PARIS, Oct. 23. A despatch from Coblenz to Havas Agency to-night says, "Ehrenbreitstein fortress, the most formidable stronghold in Rhineland is generally referred to in occupied territory as the castle. Its capture would be of great importance as it commands not only Coblenz, but the Rhine River for miles."

JULICH REFUSES TO SECEDE.

JULICH, Prussia, Oct. 23. The Separatist movement in this Rhineland town was short lived. Police, aided by firemen, armed with guns, axes, hatchets and clubs, to-night expelled the Separatists from the Rathaus and Post Office, which they occupied on Monday. About 20 of the Separatists were arrested. The rest fled the country.

SEPARATIST FAILURE IN MAYENCE.

PARIS, Oct. 23. A despatch to Havas Agency from Mayence says that five persons were killed and several wounded, all of whom were ineffective spectators during an attempt to establish the Rhineland Republic in Mayence. The attempt failed before the determined resistance of working men, organized by Unions. The Separatists were repulsed and pursued by the working men. During the flight shots were fired.

FIGHTING IN AIX.

BERLIN, Oct. 23. The newspapers print conflicting reports concerning the situation at Aix-la-Chapelle, but it is said that twenty-five civilians were wounded in fighting there to-day.

WILL IMPEACH WALTON.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 23. Impeachment trial for Governor J. C. Walton was assured to-day, when the Lower House of the State Legislature approved the second of twenty-

two charges against the Chief Executive, contained in a bill of impeachment submitted by the committee of investigation and impeachment.

GOVERNOR WALTON SUSPENDED.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 23. Governor J. C. Walton was suspended from office this evening when the State Senate, by a vote of thirty-six to one adopted resolution relieving him of his official duties following the submission of the Lower House of a bill of impeachment against him.

COLUMBIA MAY CONTEST.

GLOUCESTER, Oct. 23. The schooner, challenger for the International Fishermen's Trophy was found to-day to have had her keel slightly splintered by striking a rock just after leaving Gloucester for Nova Scotia yesterday. Capt. Ben Pine, her skipper, with a party of experts, examined the vessel this morning, and decided that a new piece fitted into the damaged part of the keel and the Columbia would be ready to slide off the ways to-morrow and sail for Halifax to-morrow afternoon.

RIOTING IN HAMBURG CAUSES SEVERAL DEATHS.

HAMBURG, Oct. 23. Several persons were killed or wounded here to-day in outbreaks of rioting, which began when Communists attempted to storm all police stations in the city.

GERMANY'S TURMOIL.

COBLENZ, Oct. 23. The Rhineland Republican Movement was believed extending in some quarters to-day, but seemed to be receding in the districts first affected. Berlin maintains that the movement has been generally defeated. The most important new accession of the Separatists was Duisberg in Ruhr, where, according to a Belgian official message, the Republic was proclaimed to-day, and the public buildings occupied. On the other hand Berlin reports describe the expulsion of the Republicans from Aix-la-Chapelle, where the present movement saw its inception on Sunday. Coblenz, where the Republicans plan to make their capital was still in the hands of the old officials in the forenoon. Conflicting reports from Bonn, where the Republicans are reported to have seized the Government offices. Berlin advisers say that the Separatists were defeated there. Food disorders in the interior of Germany, continue, the most serious being at Hamburg, where rioters to-day seized several police stations, only to be driven out again. Plundering of shops was carried on and the turbulence has not subsided at latest reports.

S.S. WESTMORELAND IN DISTRESS.

NEWPORT NEWS, Oct. 23. S.O.S. calls, purporting to come from the British steamer Westmoreland, were picked up here last night by the Danish steamer Phoenix, according to the captain of the Phoenix, who came ashore to-day. The Westmoreland was reported to be fourteen miles east of the Fire Gathorn Bank Lightship, off Delaware Breakwater. The first message was received at 7 o'clock and a few minutes later another was intercepted saying that the seas were overwhelming and that the lifeboats had been smashed. Later a message asked that the crew be saved. The Phoenix wireless operator again called the Westmoreland, but got only the letter S, and nothing else. The Westmoreland is believed to be out of Boston for the south.

LONDON, Oct. 23. The flood of immigrants to United States for the November quota begins this week with the sailing of five steamers, carrying eight thousand passengers. One of these, the Megantic, sailed yesterday with nearly two

BRITISH SCHOONER IN DANGER.


SANDY HOOK, Oct. 23. An unidentified three-masted British schooner is in distress to-day off Etank Life Station, thirty miles east of Fire Island. The coastguard cutter Seminoles was ordered to her assistance. A forty mile northeast storm raged along the coast to-day. The Seminoles expected to reach the schooner before nightfall. Coastguard headquarters were advised that the schooner had not rounded, although just outside the breakers, and her chances of escaping yet, were good, as the crew were trying to tack out of their predicament. A heavy sea is running along the entire New York and New Jersey Coast.

GREEK COUNTER-REVOLUTION.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23. The Greek counter-revolutionary movement yesterday had virtually isolated Athens from rail and telegraph communication with other parts of Greece, according to advices from Athens to the U.S. State Department, last night. The message said it was not possible to tell how extensive the movement was in the Greek army.

MURDERS FIVE THEN SUICIDES.

BEND, Oregon, Oct. 23. Six charred bodies were found dead in a farmhouse here Decatur to-day. The dead are Lie Chasses, found with a revolver close to his head; three children, Mrs. Anna Lordee, Chasse's sister, and her nine year old daughter. It is thought that Chasses shot the others and then himself.
