## PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS OF NEW YORK ON STRIKE

### Several Thousand Revolt in Protest Against System of Administration

New York, Oct. 17.—The police continued today to guard the four public schools on the Upper East Side, where several thousand pupils went on strike yesterday as a protest against the so-called Gary system of school administration, which has been made an issue in the local majority campaign. The trouble started when pickets attempted to prevent pupils from going to their classes at public school 172. Several boys who refused to be influenced by the pickets were beaten and their books were taken from them and carried to a vacant lot and burned.

The strike leaders gained hundreds of recruits at the noon recess and joined in parade to Central Park where a demonstration was held that brought out police reserves and resulted in several hundred pupils being herded into automobile trucks and forced to return to their respective schools.

When classes were dismissed for the day many parents of pupils were at the doors of the school houses and at the first sign of disorder fought the police who intervened. Despite their frantic attempts to prevent arrests, the police rounded up a dozen of the ring-leaders.

### AN AUTONOMOUS STATE

London, Oct. 17.—At the Socialist convention at Wurzburg, Herr Schleimann, the majority Socialist leader, rejected the principle of the right of nations to determine their own destiny so far as concerned Alsace-Lorraine, on the ground that Alsace-Lorraine was not a nation. There was general accord at the convention that an autonomous federal state in the empire.

### MICHAELIS, THE DICTATOR

Copenhagen, Oct. 17.—The Berlin correspondent of the Fremdenblatt of Hamburg, an able political observer, discloses indications that forces actually are at work in the entourage of Chancellor Michaelis with the thought of a military dictatorship, or at least with the idea of having the chancellor continue in office in defiance of the reichstag, supporting himself by military backing.

### SITUATION IS GOOD

London, Oct. 17.—It is announced that the health and sanitary conditions of the entire forces in Salonica are better than ever before. There is no epidemic, no plague, and no typhoid. In the suppression of typhoid, used has been made of a new serum based on oil, which has given satisfactory results. A French army report estimates that for the whole French army the average number of typhoid cases has been reduced to less than 20.

### BOMBPROOF SHELTERS

London, Oct. 17.—London's bomb-proof shelters are being card-indexed in preparation for further German raids. Sufficient tunnels, arches, crypts, basements and substantial buildings have inventoried to accommodate 1,000,000 persons.

Winnipeg, Oct. 17.—Midland Master Co., an Airedeale, owned by J. F. Newman of Regina, Sask., cleaned up in his class at the dog show being held by the Winnipeg Kennel club here today.

## FEW R. C. PUPILS ATTEND CALGARY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Only 25 or 30 Pupils Will Be Affected by Bishop McNally's Instructions

The instructions issued by Bishop McNally in his sermon last Sunday night that all Roman Catholic pupils must attend the separate schools, will not affect the attendance at the public schools to any great extent. Dr. Scott, the superintendent of the Calgary public schools, stated that at the present time there are not more than 25 or 30 Roman Catholic pupils attending the public schools. "These pupils," Dr. Scott stated, "are spread all over the city among the 30 or 40 rooms and will not be affected by the general attendance of Calgary public school pupils." Asked if there was any particular reason for this, Dr. Scott stated that as far as he knew it was not so much as he knew it was a matter of convenience for the pupil.

## MAY BREAK AWAY Austrian Premier Displeased With Michaelis.

London, Oct. 17.—The Deutsche Tages Zeitung of Berlin, as quoted in an exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam, says that Count Cernin, Austrian foreign minister, recently requested the German chancellor, Dr. Michaelis, to state Germany's peace terms, arguing that Germany make concessions in the west. Count Cernin received a vague reply, whereupon he stated that he could no longer negotiate with Dr. Michaelis, inasmuch as the chancellor made vague statements when clearness and frankness were imperatively necessary.

## OPPOSE WAR CREDIT

Amsterdam, Oct. 17.—A German Socialist newspaper says the Socialists have decided to vote against the new war credit of 10,000,000,000 marks, which is to be submitted to the reichstag in December, unless Chancellor Michaelis resigns.

## LARGE NAVAL DOCK

Cardiff, Wales, Oct. 17.—Work has begun on the construction of a large naval drydock at the confluence of the Wyre and the Severn at Beeston, a short distance from Cardiff. All the residents of the village of Beeston had to vacate their homes.

## CANADIAN V.C. MARRIED

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Major W. A. Bishop, V.C., D.S.O. (bar), M.C., was married today at the Timothy Eaton Memorial church to Miss Margaret Burdett, a grand-daughter of the late Timothy Eaton. Major and Mrs. Bishop left at once in Sir John Eaton's private car for Winnipeg, where the former will work for a month with the British mission.

## HELD FOR TREASON

Minneapolis, Oct. 17.—J. O. Bentall, former Socialist candidate for governor of Minnesota, was convicted in the federal district court here today on an indictment charging him with having "counseled, induced and advised" John Kasabe, his farm hand, not to register under the draft law. In December Bentall is to be tried on the charge of making disloyal utterances.

## ASKED TO REMOVE DUTY

Winnipeg, Oct. 17.—Hon. W. Winkler, minister of agriculture for Manitoba, has received a reply from the new minister of agriculture, Hon. T. A. Crenan, in reference to the duty being removed from sheep from Montana, so that Montana farmers may purchase breeding ewes. Mr. Crenan says he has taken the matter up with the minister of customs and that he will do what he can.

## ATLANTIC IN WAR ZONES

Washington, Oct. 17.—The greatest importance is attached in Washington to the brief wireless press message picked up from Berlin by the British admiralty, asserting that Germany is expected shortly to declare the coasts of the United States, Canada and Cuba to be naval war zones.

## DECLINED TEMPTING OFFER

Montreal, Oct. 17.—Controller Joseph Almey was yesterday offered the post of under-secretary of labor by Premier Jordan. Mr. Almey, who this morning announced that the offer had been made to him, said that he had been compelled to decline it because he was too much occupied with local municipal affairs. Mr. Almey is the representative of labor on the Montreal board of control.

## NO FRENCH CABINET MEETING

Paris, Oct. 17.—Contrary to the forecasts of the morning newspapers, the cabinet did not meet this morning to deliberate on the policy situation created by yesterday's vote. It is said that the cabinet will confer tomorrow at the Elysee palace, where it will be presided over by the president.

## ITALIAN SUBMARINE LOSSES

Rome, Oct. 17.—The Italian shipping through submarines for the week ending October 14, on all seas, were four steamers over 1,500 tons. One packet boat and one sailing vessel escaped after being attacked.

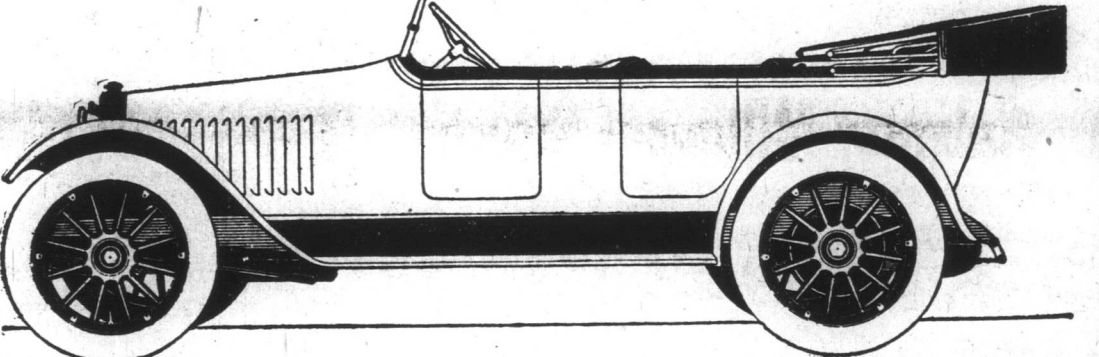

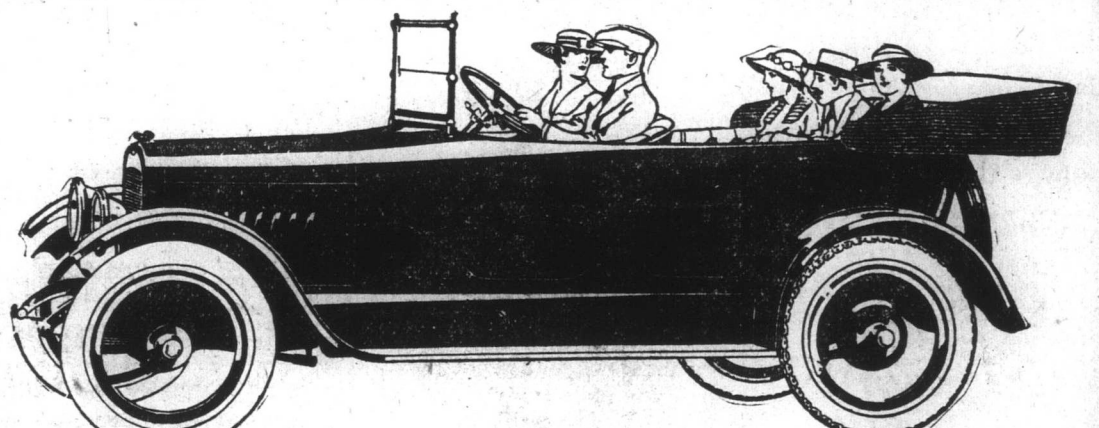
