In the case yesterday of Lackey vs. Elson, G. W. Marsh (London), for the defendant, appealed from the judgment of Armour, C. J., at the trial at London in favor of the plaintiff in an action of ejectment brought by the assignee of a mortgage against a daughter of the mortgagor, who is in possession of the mortgaged premises, and who claims that she has acquired a title by possession under the statute of limitations. The mortgage was made in 1876. E. R. Cameron (London), for the plaintiff, contra. The court held, following their own decision in Cameron vs. Walker, 190 CR. 212, that there was a new point of departure under the statute when default was made in the mortgage, and that this action was brought in good time with regard to that point. Appeal dismissed with costs.
