CEN. ECOTH'S JUBILEE.

Epitome of the Canadian Programme.

A New Scheme for Each of the Fifty Years-London Included in

the List.

The friends and soldiers of the Salvation Army throughout the world are celebrating 1894 as a Jubilee Year. Fifty years ago Gen. Booth commenced his life-work for God andhumanity. As usual, the organization is practical. The War Cry of May 19 contains a huge programme of new schemes drawn up by Commandant Booth,

totalling 50 in all. Scheme No. 1 proposes "the biggest series of meetings ever held in the history of the Army in Canada," to take place in Toronto on Wednesday, June 13, to Thursday, June 21. Almost all the staff officers of the Dominion will be present. A prominent feature will be the concluding "Mammoth Musical Festival" in the new Massey

Schemes 3 and 4 relate to a development in the social work of the Army at Vancouver and Winnipeg. Restaurants and homes of a superior character are to be established. They are to provide clean, comfortable, healthy lodgings, and substantial board at low rates. Each inmate will have a recess to himself, with trunks for his clothes and lock-ups for his valuables. He will thus be installed in his own castle and have a spot in the world he can call his own. Bath rooms, reading room, etc., will be available also. Many a youth will thus be saved from evil influ-

ences. New barracks are being, or are to be, erected at Nanaimo, Vancouver, Toronto, Windsor, Orillia, Cornwall, Brockville, Bonavista, Heart's Content, Calgary, Portage la Prairie, St. John, N. B., Woodstock, N. B. Renovations are to be effected in the halls the army already has at Hamilton, Kingston, Montreal, Ottawa and

Quebec. Scheme No. 7 .- A Shelter for Women at Toronto, started this year, is already doing an excellent work. In three months this neat home has afforded a shelter to the tune of 895 lodgings.

In scheme 10, the Social Farm, just taken near Toronto, is described. Its purposes

1. To find honest employment for any willing labor. 2. To find a healthy spot for officers resting. 3. To supply the army in the city with

farm produce. 4. To make a profit that will help to support the army's social institutions. Scheme 11 describes a new Food and Shelter for Men at Halifax, which is to be in full swing within a month. In his remarks respecting this scheme, Commandant pletely and with amazing speed. Booth states: "Geographically, Canada, and not the United States, is the key to the new world. It is only a question of steam facilities between Halifax and Liverpool, that now exist between Liverpool and New York, and it will be on the soil of Nova Scotia, rather than in the ports of New England that the North Atlantic voyager

will plant his foot on terra firma. On this account, the Halifax Shelter, which is close to the docks, will be very convenient for the many thousands of emigrants who land at Halifax every summer. Schemes 12, 13, 28, 29, 30, speak of new rescue homes for fallen women, at Halifax, . Johns, Newfoundland, St. John, N. B.

Hamilton, Ottawa. There is also to be, as scheme 14 indicates, a Food and Shelter and Sailors' Home in St. Johns, Newfoundland, which will provide a comfortable, clean, Christian, Salvation home for any sailor spending a few days in the capital of Newfoundland; cheap sleeping accommodation for any poor, hard-pressed man in the city, and cheap meals for the poor, especially in winter. London, as scheme 15 states, gets a cita-

del for the army soldiers to worship in, a Food and Shelter for poor men, and a Prison Gate Home and wood yard, where those who have no money can earn enough to procure food and lodging. Mr. Thomas McCormick subscribes \$500 towards the outfit of the place. Scheme 33 is the newest from a Salvation Army standpoint: "A Salvation Timber Limit." The army will procure

a timber limit, and find employment for the unemployed on their limit, providing them with a light, bright, sweet hotel at the same time, where there will be clean beds, a pleasant reading room, good books and newspapers and attractive army services. The beautiful work amongst the waifs and strays, so successfully carried on in the Children's Shelter, Toronto, is also a very deserving branch of the jubilee work. For

gathering the children in and getting them in due course adopted the army has unique facilities. This branch of work is to be developed. top), mattresses, springs, bedding, crib, gas brackets, baseburner, parlor stove, cook stove, Scheme 37 speaks of a Salvation Army Co-operative Store, recently instituted in

Toronto, and so far, working successfully. There is also a Navy to be floated. The remaining schemes that go to complete the 50 are all of an interesting nature. the final one being a call for 300 new officers.

The whole of the schemes represent \$130,000, of which \$45,000 is to be raised at once. In concluding, Commandant Booth remarks: "Frankly, I confess to you, as your constituted director, my heart is in this, and that is because I carnestly believe this thing is for the driving ahead of the Kingdom of God. Canada is a great country, but she is greater by far in her prospects than she is in the present tense. So sure as we live, we shall see the tides of immigration turn our way and greater floods of human beings will pour through our land. Let us be ready for them when they come. Nay, let us be equal to those already with us. We have great and grand opportunities."

We heartily wish the Army success in their great spiritual and humanitarian work.

Disastrous Fire Started Under the Boston Baseball "Bleachers."

Some Twelve Acres Eurned Over-The Ball Grounds Swept Clean by the Flames-Scores of Buildings Destroyed and Hundreds of People Homeless-Conflagrations Elsewhere,

Boston, Mass., May 15 .- The baseball

game between Boston and Baltimore was called in the second inning on account of a fire near the grounds. The fire started under the bleachers at the center field, and with great rapidity spread to the other bleachers, and then to the dwellings surrounding the big fence. Many of these dwellings have been destroyed, and it is feared there are bodies in the ruins. The blaze still rages fiercely, and is spreading toward the West End car stables near Lenox. The cause of the fire is unknown. 7 p.m. - The fire which broke out in the "bleacher" seats on the baseball grounds this afternoon consumed all the buildings

on the baseball grounds, including the grand stand and some 100 buildings, mostly small wooded dwellings. From ten to twenty persons were injured. The fire crossed Tremont street to the east, and is spreading. At least 200 families were rendered homeless. Some small Roxbury boys set themselves up as rivals to Mrs. O'Leary's cow on the Boston baseball grounds this evening, and as a result in less than three hours some

twelve acres were burned over the baseball grandstand and bleachers, a large school house and engine house, 164 wooden buildings, and 13 brick buildings were destroved, and several hundred families rendered homeless. The boys started the fire under the bleachers, and getting scared ran away,

and the flames got a good start. The occupants of the bleachers feeling the warmth under them jumped from their seats and tried to extinguish the flames by tearing the rubbish and acattering it as best they could, but the blaze gathered headway. The fire department was slow in getting to work, and the flames did their work com-A number of the firemen were slightly

injured, and Chief Webber, who was very badly injured, was taken to the city hospower and twin propellers. Given the same pital. The loss is conservatively estimated at from \$300,000 to \$500,000, although one

authority puts it at \$1,000,000. When the houses began to go before the flames the scene there beggared description. Children were crying for their mothers and mothers wailing for their offspring, and it was greatly feared that some of the youngsters were lost in the flames. A number of women fell in the street from exhaustion, and had to be carried into the

various houses in the vicinity. Before 6 o'clock help had been summoned from all cities and towns within a radius of ten miles of Boston.

Five small children were in one of the burning buildings, and they were rescued by Charles W. Eaton and a Mr. Gusick, of Brookline. COLLINGWOOD, May 15. - The cottage of Mr. Lindley was burned to-day. The wife

and children of Mr. Dewsbury, the tenant hardly had time to escape. Loss ever \$1,000. HAMILTON, May 15.—Early this morning a fire broke out in H. C. Chappell's hardware and general variety store, 286 James street north. Loss about \$2,000 on stock; insured. The building is owned by Ald.

Field and insured. Damage to bullding, about \$400. CHERRYFIELD, Me., May 15 .- One of the most destructive fires ever known in this section is raging in timber land on the west

side of the Narraguagis river. The loss may amount to \$100,000.

A TRIO OF TRAGEDIES. Three Boating Disasters in Which Fourteen Lives Were Lost,

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., May 15.— Sergts. Henderson and Weidlick, and Privates Renquest, Keating and Ross, of Company 7, Fourteenth Infantry, U.S.A., while sailing near Admiralty Head Sunday night, were capsized, and all were drowned except Keating. FOUR MORE.

BOSTON, Mass., May 15.—It is feared that on Sunday four Harvard students met their death as a result of capsizing in the harbor. Last night Supt. Bradley, of Thompson's island, found floating near the island a pair of oars, the crotchet tow boom and two coats. He took the property ashore and this forenoon turned it over to Capt. Bragdon, of the harbor police, who is now conducting an investigation. Two of the students are supposed to have been John Farnham Brown and Wm. C. Truesdale, the latter belonging in Newark, N. J. The other men in the party were Bach, of New York, and Whiteall, of Philadelphia. Two bodies came ashore on the island this afternoon, and Harvard men have gone from Cambridge to identify them if possible.

LONDON, May 15 .- A party of eleven Whitsundy excursionists started from from Ipsivich yesterday for a boat trip on the River Orwell. Through mismanagement the boat was capsized, and six of the party were drowned.
