FOR THE DEFENSE.

Doctors Give Evidence in the Hyams Murder Trial.

They Say the Elevator Weight Could Have Caused Death—The Elevator Not Working Well.

Toronto, May 21.—At the trial of the Hyams brothers yesterday the defense called Dr. Luke Teskey, Dr. I. H. Cameron and Dr. Spencer. The burden of the evidence was that the elevator weight in the examination in chief was that there was no evidence of two blows, that all the fractures on the skull might have been caused by one great crushing blow by an instrument such as the one used in the examination in chief, and that from all they were able to see and from the skull itself, the theory that the fractures all had been thus produced was the most natural and reasonable one. They all concurred in this view of the matter.

Dr. Lynd, the Parkdale coroner, Dr. Atherton and Dr. Strange gave similar testimony.

Dr. Powell stated that he had experience with a good many elevator accidents, and the wounds in this case were similar to those in other such cases.

R. B. Preston said that in 1893 Wells, with whom he was acquainted, had shown him how the elevator worked, changing the heavy weight usually used for a lighter one, and then replacing the heavy weight. He noticed and pointed out to the jury that when the heavy weight was put back it would shift on the upturned point of the hook, and not in the belly, and it looked as though it might easily fall off. On Wednesday, the day of the funeral of the deceased, witness and a tailor named White, and a second companion named Crane, went to the warehouse and experimented to see if the elevator would work with the weight half hung. They found that the weight would run up part way safely, and, working the elevator gently, might have gone to the top.

Mr. Osler, in cross-examination, brought out the fact that witness had frequent visits to the Hyams, been a frequent visitor at the office of Mr. Horne, one of the lawyers engaged for the defense. Witness' companions will be examined tomorrow.

Robert O. Preston, father of the young man who swore that on Sunday, Jan. 15, 1893, he had been in the warehouse on Colborne street with Wells, who had shown him how to manipulate the hoist, corroborated the main outline of his son's story about being at the warehouse on that Sunday. He was questioned by Mr. Osler, but stuck to his story.

Dalton P. McCarthy, who was employed at Nasmith's restaurant on King street in January, 1893, testified that Nasmith's cellar adjoined that of the Hyams, and that while he was working in Nasmith's cellar on the morning of the fatality he had heard a crash some time after 8:30 o'clock. It seemed to him as if something had gone wrong with the elevator in the Hyams' cellar. About fifteen minutes later he heard some steps on the first floor of Hyams' warehouse and a voice calling "Will," or "Wells," or "Bill," or something like that.

In reply to Mr. Osler, the witness said that in March last he had left a good position in Buffalo, where he had been making about \$3 a day, to come here to see his family. He had been here for two months and had made about \$10 in that time, not enough to keep his family. He had been subpoenaed for the defense.

TAYLOR FOUND GUILTY.

Oscar Wilde's Partner Convicted—Sentence Deferred.

London, May 21.—The trial of Alfred Taylor was resumed in the Old Bailey court this morning. Taylor was in the witness stand, and repeated statements made at the first trial. In reply to questions in regard to the visitors to his rooms, Taylor asked to be allowed to write their names. The judge said: "If the names are written I will read them aloud. I do not approve of mystery. Taylor did not write the names, but mentioned a few which have already been connected with the case. There were no notables among them. After the libel trial of Wilde against Lord Queensberry, the latter's solicitors, he said, had asked him to make a statement against Wilde, but this he had refused to do. The evidence was concluded with Taylor's testimony, and counsel began their addresses to the jury. The judge, in summing up, directed the jury to acquit Taylor as regarded his complicity with the young man Wood, leaving them to decide upon the charges in which Taylor is alleged to be directly guilty. The jury retired at 3:25 p.m. The Marquis of Queensberry occupied a seat in court in the forenoon. Taylor was found guilty on the several counts of the indictment. The court deferred his sentence.

KNOX COLLEGE VACANCY.

Toronto, May 21.—The board of management of Knox College met yesterday afternoon to consider the appointment of a successor to the late Rev. R. Y. Thompson, the professor of apologetics and Old Testament literature, and decided to recommend for appointment by the General Assembly Rev. Dr. McIntosh, of Philadelphia, the nominee of the Hamilton Presbytery. The work of the board was rather difficult, nearly every Presbytery having sent in a different nomination; but after a full discussion Dr. McIntosh's name was agreed upon by a substantial majority. Rev. Dr. McIntosh is about 54 or 55 years of age, and was born in the north of Ireland. He was educated at Queen's College, Belfast, studying under the late Dr. McCosh, afterwards principal of Princeton. He took his theology at Edinburgh University, and afterward went abroad, studying theology in Germany. In 1860 or 1861 he was called to May Street Church, Belfast, as successor to the famous Dr. Henry Cooke. After a number of years spent there he received a call to one of the most prominent churches in Philadelphia, where he remained until recently. He resigned a short time ago, and lectured last winter at Lane Presbytery Seminary, Cincinnati. Rev. Dr. McIntosh is well remembered by many persons in Toronto, as he preached both morning and evening on the occasion of the reopening of Cooke's Church after its rebuilding in 1892.

STABBED IN A BATH TUB.

New York, May 21.—During the performance of "Charlotte Corday" last night, the excitement so worked upon one of the actresses that she struck a knife into the side of Mr. Bellow. It was in the scene where Charlotte Corday enters the apartment of Marat and assassinates him in his bath-tub. Mr. Bellow groaned as the knife was thrust into his side, but the actress was not aware of the wound she had inflicted until she saw the blood slowly oozing through his fleshings. As soon as possible after the curtain dropped Mr. Bellow secured the services of a doctor, under whose care it is expected that his sufferings will be slight. It was only recently that Mr. Bellow expressed himself as tired of society roles and glad to play so virile a part as that of Marat.

THE PRICE OF OIL.

HER CARGO SHIFTED.

Queenstown, May 21.—The German steamer, Hispania, Captain Kahn, from Antwerp, May 17, for Montreal, arrived here today with her cargo shifted. Yesterday, when 250 miles west of Queenstown, she encountered very heavy weather, and 300 tons of iron rails, comprising part of her cargo, broke the stanchions which confined them and shifted, threatening to pierce the sides of the vessel when she rolled. The Hispania, which is carrying 220 steerage passengers, will have to be delayed by the unloading and reloading of part of her cargo.

PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS.

Toronto, May 21.—Secretary Sherin returned on Saturday from Washington, D. C., and New York. He had a very satisfactory interview with several Central South American and Mexican diplomatic representatives in Washington. Signor Matias Romero, Minister of the Republic of Mexico to the United States, is very much interested in the congress, and has already requested the Minister of Education of his Government to send accredited delegates in addition to securing the attendance of several distinguished gentlemen. The secretary found a large number of letters awaiting his arrival, among others from Captain Cornelius Gardener, U. S. A., commanding Fort Wayne, who has been so actively engaged working for the unemployed at Detroit. He says he will take pleasure in being present at the congress and participating in the programme. Also a letter from Hon. H. S. Pingree, mayor of Detroit, promising to be present with a large delegation. Hon. C. E.
