With Many Bodies

After the Disaster to the Steamer Monticello-A Missing Man Safe.

Yarmouth, N. S., Nov. 12 .- The shore of this county for ten miles east and west is strewn with the wreckage of the hull and cargo of the steamer City of Monticello, which foundered Saturday morning, and 25 boddies of victims of the disaster have been recovered from the sea, which is still raging with terrific fury. Many people have assemioled at Rockville, near where the first body came ashore, and numerous relatives of members of the crew, who nearly all belonged to points on this coast, have arrived to identify the dead.

The bodies were arranged in a room in the public half and Coroner Fuller, who held an inquest, gave an opinion of accidental drowning. All the bodies are terriloly battered.

THE BODIES PICKED UP.

The first body was found at daylight, when the zinc lifeboat, which was supposed by the survivors of the first boat to have been swamped, was discovered on the shore. The thole pins were broken. A few yards distant were the bodies of Mr. Eldridge, a passenger, Second Engineer Poole, Mr. Fripp, a traveler for McGee's Sons, of St. John, N. B., and the body of a seaman. All four had life belts around them. At short intervals along the beach eleven more bodies were found, making fifteen They discovered up to noon today. had all evidently come ashore in the lifeboat, and were killed on striking the beach, not one escaping. IDENTIFIED REMAINS.

The remains so far identified, in addition to the four enumerated above, are:

Capt. T. M. Harding, the commander; Second Officer N. M. Murphy, of Yarmouth; Chief Steward M. C. Hopkins, Chief Engineer Charles Greig,





MILLIONAIRE MARCUS DALY

How Montana's Mining King Got tained revenge by throwing his strength His Wealth.

His First Job in America Was Digging Potatoes on a California Ranch.

New York, Nov. 13 .- Marcus Daly, of Montana, who died yesterday at the Hotel Netherland, was born in Ireland and came to the United States at the age of 13. He landed at San Francisco, and secured a job digging potatoes on a neighboring ranch. He went to the mines before he was 15, grew up surrounded by gold and silver, was engaged by Mackay, Flood and O'Brien as foreman of the Comstock mine, and later removed to Montana, where he took the famous Anaconda copper deposit and became a millionaire. He owned immense farm lands, blooded horses and property which in Europe would be reckoned among principali-ties. He was worth about \$20,000,000 at the time of his death.

Montana's recent history has been largely the history of the Clark-Daly feud. The scars left by the strife are to be found in the state from Fort Assiniboine clear across to Fort Missoula. Yet these two giants of finance were at one time close personal friends and business associates.

It was in 1880 that Marcus Daly sold his interests in the Alice mine, and, with Clark, purchased a large tract of land on which is now located the Anaconda copper properties. Clark was then a wealthy man, and while Daly staved at home to plan great improvements and to manage the property, Clark went to Paris on pleasure bent.

He returned to Montana to find that judges. Daly had gone far shead with the work of improvement without consulting him. Clark was dissatisfied, and demanded that Daly either buy or sell. Daly was embarrassed somewhat financially, but having confidence in the Anaconda, he succeeded in raising the sum demanded by Clark and took over his interest. Since then he has taken \$20,000,000 out of the Anaconda mine-a fact which has not made his old-time associate happy.

Out of this transaction has grown a which has attracted more than national interest. After his unsuccess-ful attempt to orush Daly, Clark found that no matter what he turned his hand to, he had a resourceful enemy to encounter. If Clark was in favor of a thing Daly was against it. Clark started a daily paper in Butte City; Daly put in a plant in Anaconda, and published a paper that would do credit

to a metropolis. When Montana became a state, a dual legislature was organized. Clark and Martin Maginnis were sent to the United States Senate by the Demo-cratic branch; T. C. Powers and W. F. Sanders by the Republicans. Daly had a part in having the latter two seated.
