# Legationers May Be Alive

Mr. Morgan Claims His Informa-  
tion Is Absolutely Straight.

The Pekin Situation Said to Have Been Grossly Exaggerated

—Prince Tuan Arranging for a General Rising—Collisions  
Between Cossacks and Chinese—Reported Mas-  
sacre of Christians at Tai Yuan Fu.

New York, July 18.—Pritchard Mor-  
gan, M.P., who yesterday received a  
dispatch saying the Pekin foreign lega-  
tions were standing on July 9, is quot-  
ed today by the London correspondent  
of the World:

"My information is absolutely  
straight, but it would be fatal to my  
getting any further news if I divulged  
the source of my information. I am  
convinced the legations were standing  
on the 9th, despite the circumstantial  
accounts of the massacre.

"The whole situation has been grossly  
exaggerated, and Li Hung Chang's in-  
tervention will have a most salutary  
effect.

"An exhaustive inquiry by my agents  
in Shanghai has established the fact  
that all the stories already published  
have been based on wild gossip, and  
are impossible of authentication. Every-  
one anticipated a massacre, and  
seized upon the first rumor that seemed  
to justify their prejudice."

Chicago, July 18.—A dispatch to the  
Record from Chefoo, July 15, via  
Shanghai, July 18, says:

"A communication was received to-  
day by the Japanese consul from the  
Japanese minister at Pekin, dated  
June 29. It said that all the ministers  
were in the British legation, short of  
food, hard pressed, and unable to hold  
out many days.

"This is significant, for it is the latest  
dispatch from Pekin, aside from those  
through Chinese sources, since Sir  
Robert Hart's message of June 29, when  
he said the guns were trained on the  
legation."

**DATE FOR A GENERAL RISING.**  
London, July 18.—The Shanghai cor-  
respondent of the Express, under date  
of July 17, cables:

Prince Tuan has issued an edict to  
fix a definite date for a general rising.  
What the date is I cannot ascertain,  
but it is doubtless an early one, for  
Prince Tuan is stated to have ordered  
all dispatch, in view of the arrival of  
more foreign troops. A large body of  
Chinese tonight is reported to be mov-  
ing from Hupel in the direction of  
Shanghai. The situation here grows  
more threatening every day. The city  
is still without any means of defense,  
and all the forts are being held by the  
Chinese."

**NEW YORK CHINAMEN IN PANIC.**  
New York, July 18.—Chinamen in  
New York have been officially notified  
of the war in China, and in consequence  
of the local Celestials are in a state of fear  
bordering on panic. So afraid are they  
that the murders committed by the  
Boxers will be avenged upon them,  
that an appeal for protection in the  
form of a petition has been made to  
Chinese Minister Wu Ting Fang, in  
Washington, according to information  
received by the police of the Elizabeth  
street station. Yesterday circulars in  
Chinese were distributed through the  
Chinese quarters, copied from a cir-  
cular received from Pekin. The cir-  
cular in Chinese reads: "Shut your wa-  
y. Interpreted this means: 'Kill  
all foreign people.' The circular was  
sent to Lee Toy, mayor of Chinatown,  
by Minister Wu Ting Fang. The min-  
ister did not expect Lee Toy to make  
public the circular, and the latter only  
did so after consulting the heads of the  
secret societies.

The Chinese of the city held a meet-  
ing last night in Mott street joss-house.  
Speeches were made denouncing the  
Boxers, and resolutions "deploring the  
misfortune which has befallen the for-  
eign residents of Pekin," and "volun-  
teering to aid in the suppressing of the  
uprising of the Boxers," were passed.

**MANCHURIA DISTURBANCES.**  
London, Wednesday, July 18.—A m.-  
The news of the Manchuria distur-  
bances is not regarded as justifying the  
serious view attributed by the Daily  
Mail's advice. Amur, the boundary  
territory between Eastern Siberia and  
Manchuria, has been the scene of  
local disturbances for a long time, owing  
to the provocative conduct of the  
Cossacks toward the 25,000 Chinese em-  
ployed in the construction of the Rus-  
so-Manchurian Railway. Several seri-  
ous collisions have occurred between  
the Cossacks and the Chinese troops.  
Some weeks ago two Russian officers  
and sixteen men were killed. The ex-  
tension of the Boxer movement to  
Manchuria has resulted in a general  
destruction of the railway, compelling  
the Russians to withdraw their of-  
ficials.

The Chinese tried to stop the Rus-  
sian steamer Mychael, carrying ammu-  
nition, and the steamer Selenga, with  
the Russian frontier commission on  
board, from passing up the Amur at  
Aigun. They fired on the steamers,  
wounding an officer and a few men,  
but the steamer reached Blagovesh-  
chensk. The local Chinese commander  
at Aigun seems to have sent the Rus-  
sians a sort of ultimatum to quit  
Manchuria.

The Chinese, according to the Daily  
Mail's St. Petersburg correspondent,  
have thrown up fortifications and  
placed 40 guns at a point twelve miles  
from Aigun, to dispute the progress of  
the Russians. The official Russian ad-
