—Miss Mutch, of London, is visiting

—Dr. Leonard, United States Consul

—Mr. Ashman Bridgeman, president of
the West Elgin Liberal Association, was in
the city to-day.

—Two special migrant trains en route
to the west passed through the city on the
G. T. R. last evening.

—The Chancery Court sittings open here
to-morrow at 12 o'clock, instead of at 2
p.m. as was first announced.

—Mr. John McQueen, an employee of
Beck's box factory, leaves to-day to accept
a position in South Bend, Ind.

—The London Street Railway Company
give notice in another column of the rates
which will be charged hereafter.

—Miss Maggie Chapman has returned
home to London, after paying a visit to her
sister, Mrs. John Lamb.—[Branford Ex-
positor.]

—President Ledyard and General Super-
intendent Miller, of the Michigan
Central, are on a tour of inspection over
the Canada division.

—The return of Robert Boston as M. P.
for South Middlesex was gazetted on Satur-
day. Such promptitude on the part of
returning officers is unusual.

—The royal assent was given on Satur-
day to the various measures passed by
Parliament at the recent session, including
the two L. and P. R. bills.

—A clock will be placed over the door
at the G. T. R. ticket office, corner
Dundas and Richmond streets. It will be
a great convenience to the public.

—Rev. Dr. Robertson, the well-known
superintendent of the Presbyterian North-
west Mission, preached in Knox Church,
South London, Sunday morning.

—Mr. W. D. Wiley, of Wallaceburg, a
graduate of the Western University, has
been appointed assistant demonstrator of
anatomy in that institution for next year.

—Mr. Edward Fisher, director of the
Conservatory of Music, Toronto, with his
wife and Miss Thomas, of Belleville, are
visiting with Mrs. Charles W. Leonard,
Queen's avenue.

—Mr. Eustace G. Thompson, the late
operator on the West Shore at Farnham,
N. Y., will act as operator and ticket agent
in St. Thomas for the C. L. and P. S. R.
and T. Company.

—A couple of young men indulged in a
fight on Saturday night just around the
corner of Wellington, off Dundas street. A
pane of glass in the Metropolitan was
broken in the scuffle.

—Miss Jennie Gamble, of the Tecumseh
House dining-room, leaves this week for
Chicago, to accept a position in the hotel
there under the management of Mr. Sam.
Grigg, during the World's Fair.

—The improvements and alterations in
the new Grand Trunk ticket office at the
corner of Dundas and Richmond streets are
rapidly nearing completion. Mr. De la
Hooke will move into the new offices on
Monday morning.

—The charge of selling liquor to Indians,
preferred against Frank Jarvis, of Dela-
ware, was dismissed by Squires J. B.
Smyth and Owey on Saturday afternoon,
with costs on the complainant. Beverly
Burwell, George Woods and Edward Mc-
Lellan, were the witnesses examined.

—The city churches were all well
attended yesterday, and the services all
partook of the joyous Easter occasion.
Special music and singing commensurate
with the resurrection theme were heard in
all the churches, and in some cases elaborately
decorated.

—A Westminster farmer coming into the
city Saturday complained bitterly of the
condition of the approaches to the new
bridge on the Wharfedale road. He broke
his whiffles and his wagon was damaged.

—The services at St. Peter's Cathedral
Sunday were of an unusually interesting
nature. The altar was beautifully decorated
with hyacinths and Easter lilies. Rev.
Father McBrady preached eloquent ser-
mons and the choir furnished special music.
The Easter collections were large.

—Detectives Graham and Kennedy were
the men who were thrown out of their
rig in a runaway in the east end Friday
afternoon. They were in close proximity
to car wheels and horses' feet and had a
narrow escape. They both speak very
highly of the comeliness of P. C. Black in
stopping the flying horse.

—The funeral of the late Mrs. Martha B.
T. Sifton, mother of Mr. T. J. L. Orme, of
Port Stanley, took place from Ferguson's
undertaking rooms Sunday afternoon to
the cemetery at 11 a.m. Deceased was buried
to death at the residence of her son in Port
Stanley on Thursday morning last. The
funeral was quite largely attended.

—Mr. James Taylor died at his residence,
Aylmer, Ont., after a long illness on Thurs-
day. He was born in Ireland in 1822, and
came to Canada in 1823, remaining in
Quebec for a time and then in Montreal,
where he learned the boot and shoe trade.
He went to London in 1843, and in 1851 re-
moved to Aylmer, where he resided ever
since.

—The musical services at the Dundas
Street Center Methodist Church yesterday
were beautiful. Back's Festival Te Deum
was rendered in the morning, and in the
evening Weigand's "Raise Your Triumph
High" Miss Ziegler's solo, "I Knew That
My Redeemer Liveth," was admirable.
The quartet, with Mr. Skinner's assistance,
sang exceptionally well.

—London Circle, No. 183, Canadian
Order of Home Circles, has been awarded
a handsome set of officers' jeweled badges
by the supreme secretary of the order for
having enrolled the largest number of new
members of any circle in the order during
the past year. Among the officers for the
current year are: Dr. Sippi, past leader;
Mr. Robert Angus, leader; Miss Isabella
Gourlay, secretary-treasurer; Mr. E. D.
Croft, financial secretary; Dr. Ferguson,
medical examiner. This progressive young

circle has a prospect of doing equally good
work during the present year.

—The Presbyterian of Prince Edward
Island at their meeting in Charlottetown,
on March 22, sustained a cordial and har-
monious call from the congregation of Dun-
das, P. E. I., to Rev. John Gillis, lately of
St. Andrew's Church, Paisley, Ont.

—Arrangements have been made where-
by the Merchants' line of steamboats—
passenger and freight—will connect with
the London and Port Stanley Railway
during the season for navigation. The
steamers, which last season ran between
Montreal and Chicago, will this year ply
between Montreal and Cleveland, calling at
the Port. They are fine, large boats.

—The Cleveland syndicate people have
made arrangements for a temporary station
in St. Thomas. They have rented part of
the Elgin House, on Talbot street, adjoining
the track, and expect to have it fitted
up for use on Monday. Sheppard's store-
house will be used as a freight house in the
meantime. Mr. Howard Heard has been
transferred from the London office to St.
Thomas.

—Mr. George A. Burrell and family of
four persons, Victor street, South London,
together with a friend, Mr. Fortner, ex-
perienced symptoms of poisoning Sunday
morning. Emetics were administered and
they came around all right. It is supposed
there was something poisonous in the
viands they ate at a late supper.

—"Subscriber" is informed in answer to
his questions: (1) Mr. John A. Macdonald
(afterwards Sir) brought in his act confirm-
ing and extending separate schools in 1855;
(2) Hon. Oliver Mowat first entered public
life in 1857, when he was elected M. P. for
South Ontario; (3) the Confederation Act
received the royal assent on March 28,
1867, and the Dominion was brought into
existence on July 1 of that year.

—City Clerk Ellis has been notified by
Helmuth, Ivey & Thomas, solicitors, Lon-
don, that a motion will be made at To-
ronto on Friday, April 7, to quash the city
bylaw granting an exclusive franchise to
the Bell Telephone Company for five years.
The applicant is John A. Robinson, but it
is understood the real movers are the
Automatic Telephone Company.—[St.

conveyed to the hospital in the ambulance.
The cause of the accident was the fact that
the young man was not so badly hurt as was
at first supposed. He will probably be around
again in a few days.

—The Port Dover Maple Leaf says W.
W. Smith, of Buffalo, a representative of
the Cleveland and Port Stanley syndicate,
visited that place last week. He was taken
in hand by the reeve and other prominent
citizens and given every assistance in pro-
curing all the information he desired. He
said he had been sent by the syndicate to
find out everything he could regarding the
facilities of that place for the shipment of
coal from Erie, Connaught or Cleveland
may be deemed a small but prominent
feature and soundings of the river, har-
bor and lake in the immediate vicinity of
the lighthouse were taken and recorded.

Educational Services.

The Centennial Methodist Church was
crowded at both services yesterday, special
educational and Easter services being con-
ducted by Rev. J. Galloway, of Seaford.
In the morning the reverend gentleman
took for his subject John v., 39, and in the
evening Philippians iv., 13. Both sermons
were very interesting and instructive, dur-
ing which a special plea was made on be-
half of the educational fund, and the col-
lections of both services were in aid of

Protecting the Game.

deavouring to encourage the farmers in that
vicinity to take care of the birds in the
winter. The Ontario Government have
regarded it as commendable, and an act
will be passed prohibiting their destruction
for a number of years. The penalty for the
destruction of the birds is severe. The

EGYPT'S WONDERS.

Rev. Joseph Philip Writes on
Top of a Pyramid.

The Ancient Ruins Described—The City
of Heliopolis—The Virgin's Tree.

The letter read in the Centennial Meth-
odist Church yesterday from the pastor,
Rev. Joseph Philip, was written on the top
of the pyramid Cheops, and was dated
March 8. It was as follows:

"Here I am on the top of old Cheops.
The climb is heavy and the height is breezy,
but the prospect is fine. This is the largest
of the pyramids and, while it is not the
oldest, it is the most interesting of
them all. I am impressed with
their magnitude and age of this
tremendous pile and with the desolation
that surrounds it. Here are forgotten
tombs and neglected temples of broken
idols. I have crept into the dark heart of
this old tomb, and have measured the
king's chamber, the queen's chamber and
the coffin in the king's chamber. I had
thought that possibly the size of the coffin
and the size of the ark of the covenant were
the same, but I see now by which to make
them equal. This opening into the pyramid
points to where the north star was at the
time of the creation of the pyramids. I
have run the gauntlet with the Arabs and
have so far done very well. They are a
seeming lot of fellows and not so sleepy as
some of them appear to be. Yesterday I
visited Heliopolis, the city in which
Joseph lived and Moses went to school. It
was at one time one of the finest cities of
the world, but scarcely a trace of it re-
mains. An old obelisk 78 feet high was
really the only thing to mark the site of
the old city. I also visited the Virgin's
tree—a very old sycamore under which the
natives say the Virgin Mary sat with the
infant Jesus. The tree is certainly very old,
but I do not know as I benefited
thereby.

Fares will be charged for children oc-
cupying seats.

The "Special Tickets" that have been in
use since Dec. 1, will be accepted as
children's tickets, or two of them will pass
an adult, but tickets cut in two will not be
accepted as fare for children.

The cars will not stop on curves or street
crossings, and passengers must walk to the
car side when wishing to take the cars at
street intersections.
