SEARCHING INQUIRY IS TO BE MADE INTO TUNNEL ACCIDENT

MEAT PRICES WILL BE RATHER LOWER

British Advices Indicate a Decreased Demand for Canadian Cattle.

British advices to the Toronto Board of Trade indicate that the thrifty city housekeeper in Canada will have more cause to celebrate Thanksgiving day, one respected than the industrial farmer.
