The Unionist party had to its credit the Wyndham act, which has facilitated the rapid transfer of the soil of Ireland to the Irish people, but it had nothing to offer England or Scotland, the small holdings act of 1901 having







The present Lord Sackville, who married his cousin, a sister of the petitioner, denies that his uncle legaly married Josefa Duran, the petitioner's mother. The court disallowed a similar claim in 1903.

Ernest is the son of a Spanish daner, who married Lord Sackville at Madrid. Subsequently Sackville claimed that the woman had a husband living when she formed an alli-ance with him, and the one son and three daughters born from their union have never been recognized by courts as having any rights to the

Lord Sackville died in September, 1908. He was British minister to the United States from 1881 to 1888.
