The Niagara Power and London Electric Were Put Out of Commission For Short Intervals—Engineer Glaubitz Does Not Blame the Wind.

the Niagara power service Tuesday on again the lights were very dim night, the lights in the city going out Not Due to the Wind. everal times, A heavy storm was in progress, and it is thought that this had something to do with the trou-ble. The London Electric also had some sections go out during the night, and complaints were numerous regarding both services. Public institutions such as hospitals, etc., suffered to

such as hospitals, etc., suffered to a great extent.

The interruptions of the Niagara power service were not local, but were due to difficulty somewhere along the line. It will be reinembered that when the system was first installed, a heavy wind would put the line out of order. This trouble was corrected, however, and for some time the service has not been interrupted. Last night was the first break in many months, and it was thought that it was due to a recurrence of the old complaint.

Superintendent Glaubitz stated to The Advertiser that such was not the case. He admits that there were several interruptions, but none were over the ministration of the case.

Not Due to the Wind.

"I do not think the breaks were due to the wind. While there was a storm last night, it was not to be compared in intensity to the one we had a few weeks ago. We have come through all of them for months now without any trouble, and I do not think these interruptions were caused by that."

The London Electric Company stated that they had had some trouble, but it was local, and not in the plant itself.

"One or two sections were cut off, owing to the storm short-elreutings our wires," The Advertiser was informed. "The trouble was not serious, although some people had to do without lights for some time."

The interruptions in the service caused considerable inconvenience in several public institutions, such as the local hospitals. Both were plunged in darkness, and it was with difficulty that the nurses and others made their way about the place.
