Twenty-One Dead On New Haven

Fast Train Loaded With Home-Coming Tourists Was Run Down by Second Section—Accident Was Due to Faulty Block System.

Norwalk, Conn., Sept. 2.—Twenty-one persons were killed and nearly fifty injured in a collision shortly before 7 o'clock this morning on the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, a few miles north of here. The first section of the White Mountain Express was speeding along at about forty miles an hour in a thick fog and rushed past a danger signal, crashing into the rear section of the "Bar Harbor Express," standing 100 feet beyond the block signal.

Cut in Two. The White Mountain engine cut through the two rear Pullman cars, both of wood, splitting them in two and tossing their wreckage and three score of mangled human bodies, some alive, some dead, on either side of the track.

The third car, also of wood, and occupied by forty boys on their way from a summer camp at Monmouth, Me., was lifted into the air and the car fell on its side, crumpled up, crushed two of the boys to death and injured several others.

Hurled Over Fence. Some of the victims of the two rear Pullmans were hurled from their berths over a fence paralleling the track fifty feet distant; mattresses, bedding and clothing found lodged in telegraph wires.

A Bad Start. It was the third serious wreck which the New Haven has suffered within a year, and inaugurated the first day of the regime of Howard Elliott, the newly-elected head of the road. Mr. Elliott, returning from his summer home in New Hampshire to assume his duties, passed over the scene of the wreck on an earlier train, less than an hour before.

Were Coming Home. Practically all the passengers on both trains were returning to their homes from summer vacations, and all but two of a camping party of nine, guests of S. Crozer Fox of Ellington, Pa., returning from Maine, were wiped out. Fox was among those killed. No one was hurt in the White Mountain train.

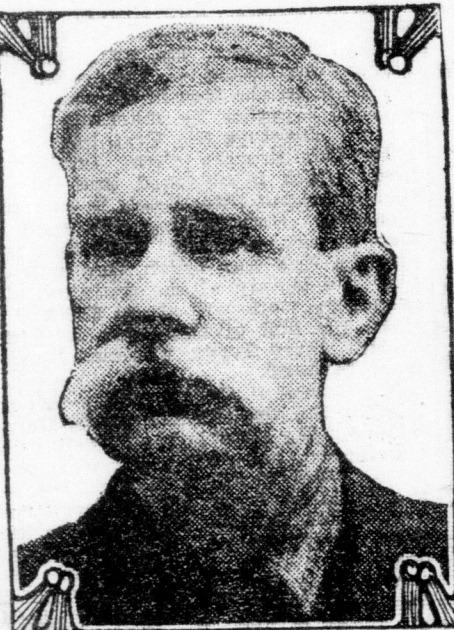

KEIR HARDIE REGRETS DUBLIN STRIKE RIOTS

Employers Are Now Considering Proclaiming a General Walk-Out.

[Canadian Press.] Dublin, Sept. 2.—James Keir Hardie, the Socialist labor member of parliament, who is here in connection with the street car strike riots and the conflicts between the strikers and the police, said today:

"I regard what has happened here as the most serious event the trade union movement has had to face for at least a century. The action of the authorities against the strike leader, James Larkin, and others, sweeps aside the whole of the trade union legislation, and restores us to the exact position in which the trade unions were before they were legalized. It is a form of action against trade unionism which is very common in America, but I did not expect to find it in any law-abiding country like our own, that the anarchist precedent of the United States courts would have been followed."

Mr. Keir Hardie went on to declare that apart from the merits and demerits of the dispute, the action of the authorities was so alarming that it must be checked at all costs. The employers of Dublin are considering the proclamation of a general lockout.

Two Burn to Death in Fire at Cobalt

Old Frame Building Proved a Trap For Many Boarders.

Cobalt, Sept. 2.—Fire early today gutted an old frame building in which several people were living at the rear of J. B. Miner's lodging-house on Argentine street, and in the debris the remains of Thomas Malley, a mill hand, and Rectave Forget, a lumberman, 52 years of age, were found.

A miner named Quigley, who is employed at the O'Brien Mine, was badly burned about the arms and body. A Finlander is dying in the mine's hospital from burns, and Frederick Roy, a young Frenchman, and his bride of but two months, had a thrilling escape from death. Finding his wife in his arms he kicked through a pane of glass with his bare feet and jumped with her in his arms from a balcony to the ground 12 feet below. Both escaped uninjured.

Forget came in from a lumber camp to spend a holiday with his daughter. He has a wife and two daughters residing in Ottawa, and a son living here. The building was owned by J. B. Miner, and was valued at \$5,000. The cause of the fire is a mystery.

Land Act Will Be Amended Shortly

Dr. Roche Plans to Restore Former Homesteading Clause.

[Canadian Press.] Calgary, Sept. 2.—Dr. Roche spent a busy day in Calgary granting audiences to deputations and conferring with local leaders of the Conservative party. In an interview he stated he would introduce an amendment to the land act of next session to provide for the restoration of the old "clock" clause relative to homesteading.

He also said the report of the ranching commission in so far as it relates to Saskatchewan would probably be adopted in its entirety, but the recommendations with reference to Alberta would be only partially adopted. The Stony Reserve Indians claimed that various religious denominations, including Indians have made promises when taking Indian children to be placed in schools that when their education should be completed they would be given assistance, and given a start in farming, and that these promises so far as the Stony River reserves were concerned had not been carried out.

Insane Man Drove Horse to Death

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 2.—Philip Adams, 37 years of age, apparently became suddenly insane today, drove across the river to Windsor, fled to a horse which he picked up in Essex, and is now locked up at Windsor.

It is understood Canadian immigration officers will not return Adams to the United States until a lunacy commission determines his mental condition. Should he not be adjudged insane he may be tried on a charge of horse theft.

Until recently Adams was a driver for a local creamery. While delivering milk he left his horse in an alley and disappeared. The next heard of him was when he bought an automobile, placed it in a pile of lumber and set fire to the lumber, destroying the machine. His lunacy took on a new form today, when he crossed the river.

Senator To Try To End Disputes

[Canadian Press.] Washington, Sept. 2.—Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire, replied today to the recent speech by his Democratic colleague, Senator Hollis, who declared New England's textile industry was being ruined by the tariff bill and assailed the textile manufacturers for recent labor troubles.

"New England believes in a protective tariff," declared Senator Gallinger, "and no man who supports the bill now under consideration or defends men like Ektor, Haywood and others of their ilk, represents in any way her views."

He assailed the Democratic bill as a whole. Democratic senators in caucus beginning tonight will endeavor to settle the differences over the income tax, cotton tax and other questions. Chairman Simmons, of the finance committee, expects to confer with President Wilson upon the latter's return from the summer White House about some of the disputed features before the caucus finally decides. Mr. Simmons looks for a vote on the bill the latter part of next week.
