

## WANTS LARGER QUARTERS FOR INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

### Principal H. B. Beal Tells Members of the Board of Trade of Educational Needs —To Protect Retailers.

Principal H. B. Beal, principal of the Industrial School, addressed the board of trade Friday evening in the board room, city hall, on technical training and industrial education. The present quarters, while thought commodious by many of the citizens, are inadequate, and the increasing popularity of the institution necessitates a larger building, he declared.

Friday night's meeting was the first held since the whirlwind membership campaign, and the attendance that crowded the room, and the enthusiasm displayed was a gratifying criterion of what may be expected in future, when industrial problems of the city are considered.

The ultimate object of the Industrial School work, Mr. Beal declared, is to provide an educative system for the boy or girl who, failing to find the courses as taught in the Collegiate suitable for their needs, will have some other line of instruction to resort to.

**Two-Fold Object.**

"The day industrial classes for boys have a two-fold object," he said. "First, to determine the industrial calling for which he is fitted by nature, and second, having discovered this, to directly prepare him for a successful career in that chosen occupation. At the same time, it should aim to train him for citizenship. This will require a strong academic course intimately and profoundly related to the practical work."

"The object of the day course for girls is largely domestic. Its purpose is to prepare them in a broad way for the duties of home-making. This will include a general education, giving special emphasis to the use of good English and the mathematics which they will require to use. The practical work in this department, dressmaking, millinery, etc., is taken up by experts possessed of shop experience, which will insure an industrial as well as a domestic bearing."

"The thoughtful parent realizes the difficulty that confronts him when the time arrives for his child to choose an occupation in life. This is at once the opportunity and the duty of the day industrial classes. The instructors should be constantly on the alert to discover the calling for which the pupil shows particular aptitude, and should advise the pupil and parent as soon as it is discovered. Education can bestow no greater benefit upon the individual than first to assist in the discovery of his natural vocation in life, and then proceed to prepare him for that vocation in a broad and intelligent manner."

"Hitherto our educational system has done this for the small minority that enters the professions. Through our industrial schools we may now open the door of opportunity to the great majority who, by the fact of their social position, are most in need of vocational guidance."

"Equality of educational opportunity must be extended to the 90 per cent."
