CENSURES WAR OFFICE

Other Members Agree With the

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—Open and active
hostility exists between the war office
of England, and the Militia Depart-
ment of Canada. There have been
rumblings for some days, but the open
declaration was made in Parliament
today by Col. Sam Hughes, minister
of militia.

Under the influence of the war of-
fice the Bisley authorities recently
ruled that no aperture sight may be
used at the next national rifle meet.
This shuts out the Ross rifle, the arm
of Canada's militia. Colonel Hughes
declares that he will provide no funds
for the expenses of a team from Can-
ada to shoot anything but the Ross
rifle with the aperture sight. The
British authorities have to come down
or the Canadian team stays at home
this year.
