RED CROSS HAS 4,500 NURSES READY FOR SERVICE IN MEXICO

Washington, D. C., April 20.—The American Red Cross has 4,500 nurses entolled and ready for service with the forces in Mexico, according to a statement today by Miss Mabel T. Boardman.

Miss Boardman said that a meeting of the Red Cross war relief board probably will be called by its chairman, Surgeon General Gorgas, of the army. She added that one of the first moves in case of war would be the establishment of reserve hospitals for sick and wounded on the gulf, Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Hospital ships for the army and navy also were contemplated. The Red Cross expects to appeal to chambers of commerce and civic organizations for support of its hospitals

The amendment makes it clear that a druggist has the right of appeal. In all the other cases, the law provides that the only appeal lies to the high court under a writ of certiorari.

One of the important changes is that giving a magistrate power to put any person on the "Indian List" who sells to, or procures for any person, already

on the list, liquor.


