GUARDS ARE CALLED OUT Spending More Than Her Two Allies - Can Finance War Fve Years From Invest ments Abroad-No Joint Loan To Be Issued.

London, Feb. 15.—3:53 p.m.—In a statement explanatory of the arrangement made at the recent conference between the finance ministers of France and Russia and himself, in Paris, David Lloyd George told the House of Commons this afternoon that the expenditure of the Allies on the war would be two billion pounds sterling (\$10,000,000,000), during the current year, of which Great Britain was spending more money than were The present war, Mr. Lloyd George said, was the most expensive in

Wednesday, Feb. 17, is the centenary of the ratification by the United States Government of the Treaty of Ghent, and is consequently the last day of the 100 years of peace that has existed on the North American continent between the Dominion of Canada and the neighboring republic to the south. To signalize this wonderful event of a century of uninterrupted peace, the city of London will tomorrow dispaten messages of peace and goodwill to the following cities across the line LONDON, KENTUCKY; LONDON, OHIO; NEW LONDON, CONNECTICUT and NEW LONDON, WISCONSIN.

This action was decided on by the board of control today and Cit, Clerk S. Baker will draft a suitable memorial message. Mayor H.
