Fine harvest weather prevails here to-day, with hot sun and slight breeze, an ideal day for ripening. Reports from farmers indicate record wheat yields on nearly all the farms in the Prince Alberta area.

The oat crop is probably the best ever harvested in Saskatchewan, according to Andrew Knox, M.P., who has been farming near Prince Albert for many years. Many oat fielids will run between 80 and 100 bushels, while the majority of the wheat fields will yield between 35 and 50 bushels.
