PASTOR DIES OF INJURIES
RECEIVED IN AUTO CRASH

CALGARY, Oct. 26.—Rev. G. H. Cobblestick, pastor of St. Paul's Methodist Church, Hillhurst, Alberta, died last night from injuries received earlier in the day when the automobile he was driving stalled on the street car tracks and was carried 80 feet on the fender of a street car. He was born in McGillivray Township, about 25 miles from London, Ontario, 60 years ago. He graduated from Toronto University in 1885. His first pastorate was a small country church. Later he held pastorates at Guelph, Brussels, Glencoe, Chatham and Woodstock in Ontario. He spent a term in Quebec City, from which place he came to Lethbridge, then to Edmonton, and from Edmonton to St. Paul's Church, Hillhurst. Mr. Cobblestick is survived by a widow and three children.

CHARM OF PLAY
CAPTIVATES ALL

"Intimate Strangers" by Mr. Booth Tarkington Delights At Grand.

Miss Elsa Ryan Heads Capable Cast of Players.

Booth Tarkington in his "Intimate Strangers," shown last night at the Grand Theatre, has chosen a captivating manner of expressing what seems to be his sole indictment against the modern flapper—that is to say, her lack of charm.

Through his hero, one William Ames, he questions broadly what charm there can possibly be in a young rowdy, in breeches and with a flask of home-made gin on her hip? Then through his heroine, Isabel Stuart, he proceeds to portray in contrast most convincing, a woman from whom charm positively radiates, transparent yet mystifying, elusive, lovely.

Booth Tarkington's humor has come to be known as inimitable. He has seized upon the outstanding characteristics of modern youth, coupled with them the instincts of youth, since youth was, and made of the two adolescents who are unbelievably real.

In "Intimate Strangers," there is the flapper and her youthful satellite, but they are forced to second place, while the stalwart, clever, over-thirty hero woos the lovely, gracious, capable and something-just-under-thirty heroine.

The plot itself is of novel, albeit, simple construction—just the mystification of love at first sight, in the case of a couple, who are stranded in a lonely railway station with only a hard-boiled egg and a chicken sandwich between them and with a few puzzling facts about marriages and ages and dates thrown in to enhance the general effect. In the role of Isabel Stuart, Miss Elsa Ryan was ideal, living up in adorable fashion to what might have been the highest expectations concerning her.

Fascinating of appearance in the first place, she had little difficulty in weaving her own personality round a role which called for so much of grace and charm, and of the whimsical humor which must really be an indispensable factor of her own nature, she was able to endow her lines with quaint twists and flashes of bright comedy. There are, too, brief moments when the play drops into mood, other than light humor, and when a thought or two of Tarkington's philosophy is driven home. Always Miss Ryan is perfection itself.

The supporting cast is not large, and each is given opportunity to stand out in effective characterization.

Coates Gwynne, as Ames, with feeling and skill, brings out the admiration of a thinking man for the woman of poise and charm; and his resentment against the noisy, hedonistic young thing, who, for the sake of what she terms freedom, has sacrificed the all-important quality of charm.

Play Parts Well. In Mary Wall was seen a flapper against whom the audience, however much they agreed with the hero in his opinion, still could not bear his resentment. Her satellite, Johnny White, was played by Don Harrington, whose portrayal of the callow adolescent was both clever and amusing.

Lila Leigh carried well the air of aristocratic dignity which emanated from the role of Aunt Ellen. Minor roles were well taken by Harry K. Fowler, Fred Couter and Rene D'Arcy.

In the last act of "Intimate Strangers" there is a lighting arrangement which makes an old-fashioned drawing-room, with its glowing fireplace, more a reality than an effective stage setting. Here, too, Miss Ryan's acting reached its very finest point.

Remembering the play, there are so many quaint and pretty and humorous things about it that one may best express one's self by a cordial indorsement of "Intimate Strangers" as a play too very much worth while to bear missing.—Olivia.

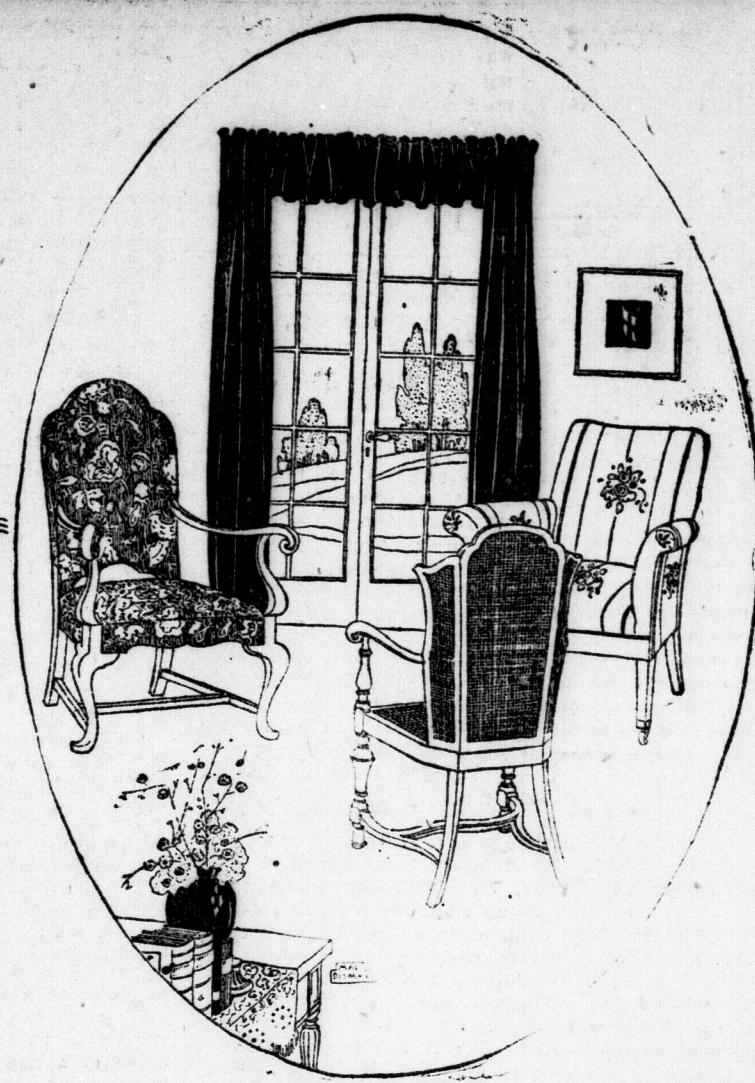
The open season for hunting deer and moose in Northern Ontario is rapidly approaching. South of the French and Mattawa rivers, Nov. 5 to Nov. 20 inclusive; north and west of these rivers, Oct. 25 to Nov. 30 inclusive. North of the Trans-continental Railway line, the season is from Sept. 15 to Nov. 15 inclusive. The Canadian National Railways traverse the finest hunting territory in this country.
