



JUDGES COMPLETE WINTER FAIR TASK.

All Prizes in Live Stock Classes Are Awarded at Guelph.

WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Guelph, Nov. 12.—Matchless Duke, premier shorthorn steer owned by John Kopas & Sons, Elora, won the last of the championship awards, that is, market cattle, just prior to the closing of the livestock judging at the Ontario provincial fair this afternoon. One thousand people witnessed the judging today.

The cattle for the purple ribbon was between Matchless Duke and the Manitoba champion, a hefty Aberdeen Angus, bred and owned by the Manitoba agricultural college, the shorthorn winning out by the closest possible margin. The winner, a big red and white animal, showing class and finish in every line, took fifth place in his class at the Canadian national exhibition, but has improved considerably since then. His Manitoba opponent was first at Brandon fair in a class of 80.

Win Championship.
John Kopas & Sons of Elora, as well as winning the championship, also captured the dominion government special for best three steers. Bate Bros. of Oakville won first award for 3-year-old light horses, and Leslie & Davy, Saskatchewan, had the best three get on sire, two years and under.

This morning was given over entirely to the judging of market cattle, fine fat steers and heifers in perfect beef condition. The classes were filled to overflowing, no less than sixty-two choice heads of beef cattle being in the arena at one time. In the 770 pounds to 900 pounds class for steers or heifers, the red ribbon went to Lowe & Helben, Elora. In the class for steers or heifers, 1,051 pounds to 1,200 pounds, Kopas & Sons' Matchless Duke, grand champion, romped away with the top award. In the steer or heifer class, 901 pounds to 1,050 pounds, "Boy Blue," a splendidly built animal, owned by J. P. Henderson of Guelph, after a keen contest, captured first place from Amos & Black's Cedar Grove champion.

The judging of several classes of horses this afternoon completed the livestock awards.

U. F. M. URGES GOVERNMENT TO CANCEL BOARD RULING

Winnipeg, Nov. 13.—A resolution urging the federal government to immediately cancel the recent ruling of the board of railway commissioners on the Crow's Nest Pass freight rates agreement in order to vindicate the supremacy of parliament, was adopted by the executive boards of the United Farmers of Manitoba and the United Farmers of Western Manitoba, in session here last night. Another resolution opposing the sale of pulpwood areas in Manitoba to private interests by the federal government was adopted.
"Manitoba must control the development of her natural resources," the resolution declared.

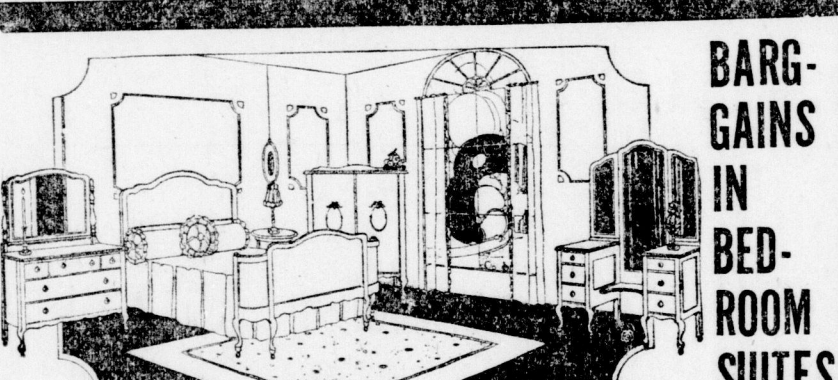

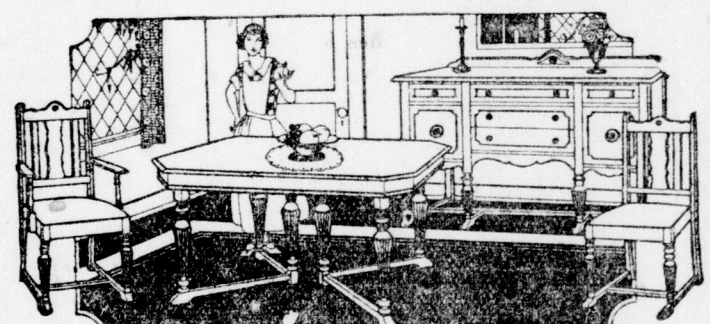
