TYPHOON AT MANILA.

U. S. Transport's Saiftog Delayed by Momentous Document a Brief and a Businesslike Statement.

Washington, Sept. 26.—The war department today received a cablegram from Manila saying that the transport Logan has been delayed from sailing from that port by a typhoon. No mention is made of damage to property. Manila, Sept. 26.—A typhon swept over this city yesterday. The storm lasted three hours, and at 2 p. m. the wind attained a velocity of 105 miles an hour. The property damage is estimated at \$500,000. Ten natives were killed and 1,000 rendered homeless.
