



AN ARMY OF COUNTERFEITERS. 280 Makers of Bogus Coins Under Arrest i

New York, Dec. 26.—A Recorder special from the City of Mexico says: The instruction into the work that is being done in this city by counterfeiters have made some startling discoveries. It is evident there is an organized colony of several hundred persons scattered about the city employed in making and pirculating spurious coin. irculating spurious coin.
Thousands of dollars of the stuff has been successfully passed within a few weeks. Arrests of members of the ban have been made daily, and now 208 to them are in prison awaiting trial. But the industry still flourishes.

A SOLID SENTENCE.

Stephenson, the first of the police officials tried and convicted as an outcome of the exposure brought about by the Lexow Committee, was sentenced by Judge Ingraham in the Court of Oyar and Terminer to-day to three years and nine months in Sing Sing and to pay a fine of \$1000.

There is no other question to be dealt with by the new council of such importance to the city as the aqueduct question. No other question involves so much of immediate advantage to the workingmen who can get no work to do or so great an ultimate advantage to the city by providing the cheapest power in the world, and thus helping to make Toronto one of the greatest manufactur-ing centres of America.
