for Michigan, and that was what he

intended to secure by his action with

reference to the Wilson Bill.

After recess Mr. Charlton said that

while the Government supporters abused

him they did not hesitate to take ad-
vantage of privileges he had obtained

for them. If they were genuine and

consistent in their protests why did they

not repudiate the privileges ob-
tained?

Mr. Bennett said the hon. gentleman

had pursued a discreditable course, and

if the Opposition were pleased with him

they were satisfied with what he had

done. Col. Amoyt said whatever were the

motives of Mr. Charlton's action they

were not patriotic, and his procedure

was not straightforward. It was not

the first time Mr. Charlton had shown

a lack of patriotism. In 1885, when he

returned from Canada to the States—
Sir Richard Cartwright: "Are yousure it was not the Northwest?"
(Laughter.)

Col. Amoyt: "No, it was not from the

Northwest, and I will tell you why, be-
cause, in 1885, in the Northwest expedi-
tion, the Government did the best tosend only men loyal to the Queen."
(Hear, hear, and heers.)

Col. Amoyt said that Mr. Charlton's

letter, which ridiculed Canadian volun-
teers, and spoke of Canadians gener-
ally as "not remarkable for their intel-
ligence."Col. Amoyt also referred to Mr. Charl-
ton's other letter, in which he said:
"With a French-Canadian leader, andunder the manipulation of such unscrup-
ulous machine politicians as Mr. J. D.
Edgar, I have not the utmost confi-
dence in the prospects of the liberalparty. The Colonel created great amuse-
ment by referring to Mr. Charlton as
"the hon. preacher, I beg pardon, the
hon. member, and went on to say that

long as the Liberal party had in its

midst men who despised their chief,
their colleagues and their country, not
only the bill introduced for the supportof morality would save the Liberal
party from defeat and dishonor."
(Cheer.)

Col. Tisdale said that as a native of

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THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING.

LORD ABERDEEN AT MILTON.

His Excellency Lays a Corner Stone, Re-
cites Numerous Addresses and
Makes a Public Reception.Milton, June 4.—The corner-stone of
the new Grace church (Anglican) was
laid here to-day by His Excellency Lord
Aberdeen, who, with Lady Aberdeen,
arrived by special train from Toronto
shortly after 1 p.m. An address of
welcome was presented at the C.P.R.
station by Mayor McCollom and the
Town Council, after which the Vice-
Regal party drove for luncheon to the
residence of Judge McRobb and met
His Lordship the Bishop of Niagara
and a few prominent residents of this
neighborhood, including Judge and Mrs.
Snider, Canon Worrell of Oakville, Rev.
P. T. Mignot, incumbent of Grace
Church, and Mrs. Mignot.

A very large crowd assembled to

witness the laying of the corner-stone,
which took place at about 3.30, and was
followed by a short speech from His
Excellency. The Vice-regal party was
conveyed in carriages to the Town
Hall, where the Bishop of Niagara pre-
sented an address on behalf of the rural
denizens of Halton, to which His Ex-
cellency replied, expressing his hearty
approval of the loyal sentiments con-
tained in the address, and the sym-
pathy and friendly spirit displayed to-
wards other religious bodies.An address from the County Council
of Halton was then presented by Dr.
W. H. Mignot, expressing the joy and
gratification that Lord and Lady
Aberdeen were continuing in Canada
the philanthropic and patriotic good
works which they carried on during
their residence in Ireland to the great advantage of that
country.

His Excellency, in his reply, said that

he was greatly pleased with the agri-
cultural aspects of this part of Canada,
and that he was something of a farmer
himself, he took a special
interest in agriculture. He said that he
was glad to be able to come to pay our
visits to rural districts in Ontario.After the presentation of the ad-
dresses, Lord and Lady Aberdeen held
a reception in the Town Hall, where
a number of Haltonians were present.
The Vice-regal party took their train
for the east at about 6 p.m.

A Revolver Again Figures in a Midnight
Row in Restaurant.The "Soldiers' Retreat," 124 Pear-
