MONTREAL, Oct. 1-(By Canadian Press)-Interviewed here this morning in regard to the Home Bank of Canada, Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, general manager of the Bank of Montreal and president of the Canadian Bankers' Association, issued the following state-

"The bankers of Canada at large have notdefinitely agreed to undertake to advance to the curator the funds required by an assignment of the assets of the Home Bank. On the other hand, they have favorably considered the matter and may probably make an advance if and when the legal formalities have been satisfied.' NOT AN INDEX.

It is pointed out by banking authorities that this does not offer any indication of the Home Bank's position. It does, however, indicate that the assets will amount to a sum well in excess of the advance that may be made. 



German Troops Ordered To Suppress Revolt Ruthlessly.

LONDON, Oct. 1 .- The revolutionary movement originated by nationalist organizations has broken out at Kues trin, 50 miles from Berlin, says a Reuter dispatch from the German capital. The insurgents attempted to disarm the garrison and occupy the fortress, but the commander of the Reichswehr arrested the nationalist leaders and drove back the attackers. Detachments of Reichswehr from neighboring towns have been summoned to Kuestrin, the dispatch adds, and the troops have been ordered to suppress the revolt ruthlessly. As a result of the insurrection Dr. Gessler, the minister of defense, has imposed a censorship on all news of a military character. NEWS IS CENSORED.
