FOR BETTER TEACHERS.

Old Third Class. Certificates to be Abolished-Summer Schools and Institutes.

The Provincial Government proposes to establish in every county a Teachers' Institute, which will meet for a few days in September of each year. All teachers will be asked to attend these institutes. which will be conducted on professional lines by professional men from the staffs of the new Normal Schools. Third-class certificates are to be aban-

doned and teachers holding these quali-fications are to be given opportunity to secure advanced certificates by an exam-ination divided into four annual parts.

Such was the pronouncement of Dr. John Seath, speaking officially on behalf of the Minister of Education, to the

of the Minister of Education, to the gathering of York county teachers in the Normal School auditorium. "The aim of the Department is to in-crease the salary and improve the con-dition of the teacher, particuiarly the public school teacher," said Dr. Seath, "It is felt that for the past ten or fifteen years this subject has not had sufficient attention. We desire to improve the qualification and the salary. The com-pulsory feature of the minimum salary has been abandoned for inducement, and has been abandoned for inducement, and I may tell you that the Minister has fur-ther in contemplation special recognition to schools who are paying their teachers well.

well. "Summer schools are to be held from time to time," continued the Superin-tendent, "and tollowing the establish-ment of the new Normal Schools, it is proposed to establish Teachers' Institutes in every county in which professional work will be conducted by men of experi-ence. Provision will be made for the teachers to attend these institutes for some days in Septembe." Interviewed by The Newe concerning the announcement, both Hon. Dr. Pyne

Fifty Years in The Ministry.

"The grand old man" of London Meth-odist conference is Dr. Alex, Langford, of Stratford, who a few months ago cele-brated the fiftieth annirersary of his entry into the work of the ministry, and who now retires to the position of a sup-erannuated minister, crowned with years of successful toil and atanding high in

the esteem of his colleagues Dr. Laugiord is a man who has defeat-ed prophecy. When he went on his first circuit at Belmont a few miles from Lonand prophecy. When he well on his first circuit at Belmout a few milles from London, in the year 1856, it was a rather general opinion that if he lived more than three or four years he was put on what was known as the Warwick mission, which comprised about twenty preaching points and extended over half of the County of Lambton. Over this Dr. Langford rode on horseback through the woods and muddy roads—for Lambton till has a reputation for mud, and perhaps it was the very hardship—at any rate, he didn't die, as friends predicted, but, if anything, grew stronger.
"Those were days of hardship," he ways, "of a very real kind, but na ll my fifty years I have had no years which brought so much into my life as those on the Warwick mission."




Boy Killed by Lightning.
